Burglars' Tools.

"There are two houses in New York which supply burglars' tools, and make big money at it," said a Pinkerton detective the other day.

"Why are the proprietors not arrested?" he was asked.

"Because it is almost impossible to get proof against them. It is morally certain that they deal in such wares, but moral certainty isn't always legal evidence."

"What do the tools cost?"

"From \$75 to \$125 a kit."

"And what does a kit contain?"

"Every good kit has a jimmy, a powder can and fuse, several cold chisels, some steel wedges, a turpentine can to soften safe metal, and a set of skeleton keys. The jimmy alone costs \$25 to \$45. It is about six feet long. The best jimmies are now made jointed, so that they can be broken into three pieces for convenience in travel. The cold chisels are of fine steel. So are the wedges. Some are the thinnest that can be made by hand. The powder and turpentine cans are of ordinary make. The skeleton keys come in leather folders like old-fashioned wallets, to wrap up and keep the keys from clinking. There generally are a dozen keys in a folder."

"As the business must be carried on very secretly, I can't see how there can be much profit in it."

"But there is, just the same. Each of the houses I speak of does a business of several thousand dollars a year. Nearly all their receipts are clear profit. Why? Because no living being likes to be swindled so well as a thief. A jimmy he will pay \$45 for is worth probably \$10. But he likes to be gouged because it's what he believes in doing to other people. Besides, he cannot get his jimmies anywhere else."

"I suppose, too, the transactions are all spot cash, which is a big point in itself?"

"That's where you're away off again. The very foundation principle of the burglars' tool business is the good, old-time one that 'there's honor among thieves.' A crook goes to one of these houses and says what he wants. Mr. Dealer says, 'So much.'"

"O. K.," says the crook; "I have a little job on hand that will pay you so much. Unless I make a bad break of it I'll be around with the stuff in bulk."

"All right; go ahead," says Mr. Dealer; "but remember, no monkey business. I'll turn you up if you try any of my tricks."

"O! goes the crook with his tools, and, unless, as he says, he makes a bad break and gets nabbed, back he comes with the stuff. If it is silverware or gold jewelry the dealer melts it up for him, charges a neat figure for that, and takes his pay for the kit of tools out of what's left. Precious stones the dealer will also take at a considerable under valuation in the same way. So, you see, the industrious burglar gets pretty well plucked, even if he doesn't happen to get jugged, which he always does in the long run; always."—N. Y. Sun.

AN OX BOILED WHOLE.—An experiment rare, if not unprecedented, was tried on Jubilee Day at Liss, a village on the London and Southwestern Railway in Hampshire. It consisted in boiling a bullock whole, in addition to one roasted the evening before. A hole dug in the ground was built over with bricks. Into the latter was built a tank, and into the tank was lowered the carcass, placed within a case formed by iron bars, to which chains were attached. Pile-ropes from a scaffolding immediately above raised and lowered the ox, of which the head and carcass were sewn up separately in strong canvas. Carrots were boiled with it, and potatoes enclosed in bags, making gallons of rich soup. The fat was removed from the carcass before boiling. At 5 p. m., the carcass, which had been boiled about seven hours, was raised from the tank, two bands playing "God Save the Queen" and "Rule Britannia" on the scaffolding above. It was placed on a large birch-like vehicle and carried on the shoulders of twelve men to the booth where it was to be cut up, the bands playing in front. A beautiful wreath and flags were placed over the ox, and the gentlemen who gave the bullocks, the butcher, and an assistant, were borne along with it over the heads of the crowd. The meat was pronounced excellent, and was certainly well cooked. The knife and fork used on this occasion were especially manufactured for the purpose in the village.—London Times.

ACCIDENT ON THE B. & O. R. R.—An accommodation train on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad ran into an open switch just after leaving Pittsburg yesterday afternoon and was precipitated over an embankment twelve feet high. The engine, combination baggage, and smoking car, and one passenger coach were almost completely wrecked, and eight persons, including the engineer and fireman, injured. The train was proceeding at the rate of about six miles an hour, and reached the bench street bridge, when the engineer noticed that his engine had suddenly left the main track. He put on the airbrakes as quickly as possible, but before the train could be stopped it went over the hillside. The baggage car and passenger coach rolled down and fell on their sides and the engine turned over. Engineer J. J. Moore and fireman Frank Hughes were thrown from the cab and badly hurt. The former was terribly scalded and will

probably die. Hughes had an arm broken and was badly bruised. All of the passengers escaped unhurt but six, who jumped from the train when it first left the track. It is not known how the switch happened to be opened, but it is believed to have been the work of some malicious person, and the railroad company will institute a vigorous investigation. Engineer Moore, who was taken to the West Penn Hospital, died at midnight.
