Mahone on Peanuts.

Until the Hon. William Mahone saw his opportunity to put his Senatorial office and honors into market in a trade with the republicans the excellence and beauty of the existing tariff had never occurred to him.

When elected to the Senate of the United States by the democratic Legislature of Virginia, Mahone was, or pretended to be, in favor of the traditional democratic policy of a tariff for revenue, for which Virginia has almost invariably given her votes in Congress and in Presidential elections. But no sooner did Mahone conclude his bargain with the republican Senators for control of the Federal spoils in Virginia than he threw in his rennant of democratic principles along with the deal. It did not require much further perversion to make the chief debt-repudiator of Virginia a convert to tariff robbery in its worst forms. A man whose only prominent political policy consisted in repudiation of a public debt could not be expected to balk much at any other species of public robbery.

In a conversation at the American Protective Tariff League in New York, reported in the Tribune, Gen. Mahone complained that the usual protectionist literature was over the head of the "average Virginian." There was nothing, Mahone said, more beautiful than Mr. Blaine's speeches in favor of Bessemer steel, but the Virginia negroes could not feel the force of the argument. For that matter, there are a great many other people in the United States besides the Virginia republicans who cannot appreciate the excellence of a system which has enabled the Bessemer combination to export upward of twelve million dollars over and above honest and legitimate profits from American consumers within the last twelve months. But Mahone, who is much above the "average Virginian" in intelligence, can readily understand how such a species of extortion and plunder operates for the discouragement of railroad enterprise in the United States.

There is one thing, however, Mr. Mahone assures the Tariff League, which the colored republicans of Virginia do understand, and that is the duty on peanuts. He says: "When they are told that there is a duty of twenty-five cents a bushel on peanuts, that keeps out African peanuts, they understand it." These "average Virginians" may only dimly perceive how they are protected by the taxes which the tariff assesses upon their salt, their clothing, their coarse blankets, their shoes, the glass in their windows, the delf on their shelves, their salt fish and their rice, the hags that contain their meal, their farm implements and the medicines for their sick; but when they are reminded of the kindly care of the republican party in protecting them from the dangerous competition of the pauper peanuts of Africa they rejoice in the blessings of the tariff system. It is quite evident that the American Tariff League, in its exclusive devotion to the Bessemer steel combination and other forms of monopoly peculiar to the North, has neglected the peanut issue. A few prize essays on the influence of the tariff in developing the peanut industry in Virginia, and on the necessity of maintaining the peanut duty in order to prevent the competition of the pauper negroes of Dahomy and of the Soudan, would be timely contributions to protectionist literature.

Gen. Mahone further informed the League that the "average Virginian" wants the internal revenue tax repealed. He says that "this is a tax on our people," and that no other argument is needed than to show them that by cheapening their whisky and tobacco "they can buy something else with the difference." Nothing could be clearer and more practical than this exposition of tariff doctrine. When those necessities of life, whisky and tobacco, shall have been made abundant and cheap by a repeal of the taxes upon them, what will it matter to the "average Virginian" how high the taxes may be piled upon salt, rice, clothing, blankets, carpets, glass, earthenware and other like luxuries? There will be no necessity to appeal to the American Tariff League for any contribution from the \$100,000 fund for aid in enforcing this argument for a repeal of the internal revenue system of taxation. Hon. Samuel J. Randall has from time to time brought his statesman-like mind to bear in favor of a repeal of the internal taxes on whisky and tobacco and in favor of increased duties upon such luxuries as tin plate. Besides, is not the country already familiar with the eloquent appeals of Judge Kelley in behalf of the poor man's tobacco pipe and the camphor bottle of the wife and mother? Gen. Mahone has assured the Tariff League that if the democrats will accept this issue of "free whisky and protection to peanuts" Virginia can be carried in 1888 for any republican. This may possibly be true; but, even if it be not true, the mere presenting of such an issue shows how wide is the distance that separates the Virginia of Mahone from the Virginia of Washington, Jefferson and Madison. —Phil. Record.
