A NEW JERSEY TRAGEDY.—A horrible tragedy occurred in South Camden, N. J., a few minutes before six o'clock yesterday evening, when Wm. Willshire, fifty-two years of age, shot his wife, Ella, aged forty-seven, deliberately murdered Justice of the Peace Wm. S. Darr, colored, and then finished the work of destruction by sending a bullet through his own brain, dying almost instantly. Willshire had lived unhappily with his wife for some time. About two weeks ago Mrs. Willshire, becoming tired of her husband's abuse, went to Squire Darr's office and had a warrant issued charging him with non-support and cruelty. He was arrested, tried and ordered to pay \$9 per week for the support of his wife and children. Instead of giving his wife the amount ordered by the court he gave her but \$2. The woman, with poverty staring her in the face, appealed for more, but her husband refused to listen. The consequence being that the old family quarrel was renewed, and continued until death put an end to it. A neighbor said that previous to the tragedy Willshire entered the house, grasped his wife by the throat, and commenced choking her. She succeeded in getting away from him and ran to the office of the unfortunate squire. She was telling him her troubles when her husband, who had been informed of her whereabouts, entered, and three minutes later the wife, husband and squire were dead.
