A SUGGESTION.—One of a party of gentlemen of this city who are on a pleasure trip through the north, in a letter to a relative here says:

"We are now at Saratoga after having visited Long Branch, Elberon, Asbury Park, and Long Beach and having passed through and briefly seen the principal cities of Delaware, New Jersey and New York. STRAMBOAT CAPTAINS DIFFERENCES.—In reference to the complaint lodged with the teamboat inspectors at Norfolk on Thursday by Capt. Davis, of the Excelsior, against Capt. The remains were interred in the Methodist cemetery this evening.
