Letter from Fauquier.

[Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette.]
MARSHALL, Sept. 6th, 1887.—Your corre-
spondent has again been favored to have a
respite from home duties and will venture
to commend to all workers, whether manual
or professional, always to take rest sometime
during the year. Such will contribute to
health of mind and body. As I was de-
tained for several hours at Riverton Junc-
tion via to Boyce Station neighborhood,
Clarke county, I undertook the distribution
of Gospel tracts. One with the title "Never,"
by George C.; a wag, to whom it was offer-
ed, remarked that "by George," he consid-
ered was swearing. He was then tried with
"Two Roads," and promised to seek the
narrow one, though at the time under the
inspiration of bad whiskey, he certainly was
on the broad way.

Mr. Sam Morgan, telegraph operator at
Riverton, informed me that he had lately
forwarded to the associated press company
fifteen hundred words in a hour's time, de-
scriptive of the festivities of an excursion
party to the Luray cave.

The most casual observer will not fail to
note the mighty impetus which Northern
capital and population have already given to
the counties bordering upon the Shenandoah
railroad. The passenger trains are crowded
by travellers and tourists to the Southern
and Northern cities. In a single train there
were as many as nine hundred excursionists,
visiting Luray cave. The freight trains are
laden with grain, iron and general mer-
chandise.

The medical faculty of Marshall has been
lately favored by a visit from an eminent
New York surgeon, Dr. Lewis A. Sayre,
who, with Mrs. Sayre, was the guest during
her sojourn in Fauquier of Dr. A. S. Payne,
of Markham, Dr. Frost, of Marshall, and of
Mrs. Jones, our wealthy neighbor. Dr.
Sayre has a world wide reputation for skill
in the treatment of spinal diseases and de-
formities, especially club feet. Drs. Frost,
Taverner, of Loudoun county, and Settle,
of Paris, each brought interesting cases for
treatment. Our various telephones and tele-
graph wires had the day previous extended
invitations to the doctors of the neigh-
borhood. Among those present were Drs.
Cochrane, Clark, Slaughter, Copeland,
Green, Settle, Taverner, Speiden, Clarkson,
Frost, and Messrs. Henry Frost and R. Hor-
ner Wyeth, medical students. A bountiful
repast was extended to the party by Dr.
Frost, and the following day Dr. Sayre saw
at the farmers' bush meeting something re-
sembling an old fashioned Virginia barbe-
cue—minus mint julep. This farmers'
movement, by the way, may be commended,
since with the presence of ladies it must
tend to create kindly feelings and by encour-
aging the formation of farmers' clubs
throughout the "New South" will develop
new industries and ultimately secure a re-
cognition of the rights of the industrial
classes by the State and federal authorities.

We are unable as yet to report much ces-
sation of sickness in our midst. For the
last three months typhoid fever and dis-
eases incident to what occurs during a hot
summer and dry autumn, have affected
many of the families of Marshall and the
vicinity.

WANAMAKER ON ADVERTISING.—John
Wanamaker, the great Philadelphia mer-
chant, recently spoke as follows about ad-
vertising:

"I never in my life used such a thing as a
poster, or dodger, or hand bill. My plan
for fifteen years has been to buy so much
space in a newspaper and fill it up with
what I wanted. I would not give an advertise-
ment in a newspaper of four hundred cir-
culation for 5,000 dodgers or posters. If I
wanted to sell cheap jewelry or run a lottery
scheme I might use posters, but I would not
insult a decent reading public with hand bills.
The class of people who read such things
are poor material to look to for support in
mercantile affairs. How do I reach news-
papers? I do it in this manner: I never deal
with advertising agents. They always get
the profit the advertiser should have. I
deal directly with the publisher. I say to
him 'How long will you let me run a col-
umn of matter through your paper for \$100
or \$500, as the case may be. I let him do
the figuring, and if I think he is not trying to
gouge more than his share I give him the
copy. I lay aside the profits on a particu-
lar line of goods for advertising purposes.—
The first year I laid aside \$3,000; last year
I laid aside and spent \$40,000. I have done
better this year and shall increase that sum
as the profits warrant it. I owe my success
to the newspapers, and to them I shall per-
petually give a certain profit of my yearly busi-
ness."
