THE CURRAN TRIAL.—The trial of John Curran, indicted with Billy Williams for the murder of Officer Arnold, was continued in the Corporation Court this morning. The first witness was Dr. O'Brien. He testified to attending Arnold before his death.

CHAS. ROSS SAID CURRAN WAS WITH HIM at the south end of the Long Bridge until 6 o'clock a. m. on the day in question; then left for Washington, promising to return on the 11:37 train.

W. G. LACHAM WAS IN BLOUSE'S between 11 and 12 o'clock and was arrested by Martin; met Arnold who told Martin he had no right to arrest him as he, Martin, was as drunk as a fiddler.

ALPHONSO ARRINGTON TESTIFIED TO HAVING received a gun shot wound, and exhibited the wound. Mr. Burke said he filed Arrington as exhibit No. 1.

NEWTON FANT SAID HE CAME DOWN from Washington on the night of the killing on the 10:05 or 11:37 train; remembers that he saw prisoner on the train, who slept till he got to Alexandria, and was "waked" by a young lady.

ED. SOPER SAID HE KNEW ARNOLD; he once came to his house and drew a pistol on Henry Passaris without any provocation whatsoever. He was a very passionate man.
