LOCAL NEWS.

For this evening slightly warmer, fair weather, followed during Thursday by local showers, light to fresh variable winds, generally shifting to east and south.

YESTERDAY'S ELECTION.—The election yesterday was conducted orderly, though an extraordinary interest was manifested by both parties, and notwithstanding the State at large rolled up handsome majorities for the democratic candidates for the Legislature—that party having returned enough members to have working majorities in both branches—Alexandria city and county was destined to lose its efficient democratic delegate. The city, however, went democratic by a small majority, which was offset by the large number of colored votes cast in the county for the republican nominee. It seemed that every individual who for the first year or two harbored a real or imaginary grievance against the democratic party yesterday the occasion to vent his spleen by voting with republicans, readjusters, discontented and negroes to deprive Alexandria of her democratic representative and the honor of furnishing the speaker for the House of Delegates. While every person having the interest of the city and State at heart, and who shuddered at the thought of having General Mahone foisted upon the Commonwealth again, hoped for the best, it became apparent yesterday that the vote in this city and county would be close, and at sundown, when the polls were closed, until some time in the night, when the result was announced, the city was in a fever of excitement until the result was brought to a close by the news from the county, which showed that there the republican candidate had polled a larger vote than Judge Stuart. The following is the official vote of the city and county:

At night large crowds of people gathered at the Gazette office, the telegraph offices and at the democratic headquarters to hear the latest news. The most interest was felt in the result in Virginia and New York, and when it was definitely learned that both States had gone safely democratic, their throats here were soon forgotten. During the night small boys kindled bon fires in different parts of the city. In the Legislative election in 1885 the vote was as follows: 1st ward, Stuart, 328; Harmon, 159; 2d, Stuart, 303; Harmon, 158; 3d, Stuart, 699; Harmon, 443; 4th, Stuart, 365; Harmon, 343; Arlington, Stuart, 182; Harmon, 124; Wash., Stuart, 75; Harmon, 68; Jeff., Stuart, 73; Harmon, 174. Total, Stuart, 2024; Harmon, 1486.

Police Report.—Last night was clear and cool with five prisoners and fourteen lodgers at the station house. The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: Henry Smoot and Ben Lucas, both colored, arrested by officers Price and Bantz, for disorderly conduct, were fined \$2 each. Thomas Milton, colored, arrested by officer Grady for illegal voting, was sent to jail. Abe Douglass, Silas Harris and Robert Hopkins, colored, and Alphonso Arrington, charged with disorderly conduct, were fined and in default of payment were sent to jail.

OF NO IMPORTANCE.—A laughable incident of the result of the election in this city was the report in circulation on the streets this morning that Gen. Mahone had telegraphed the republican member elect of the House of Delegates from this city, that he might as well stay at home as neither his vote nor services could be of any avail to him (Mahone) in Richmond this winter.

Circuit Court.—Judge Jas. Keith, presiding.—Mushbach and Caton, trustees, vs. Stevens, Lawrence & Co.; final decree. Thornberry vs. V. M. Ry.; case set for hearing to-morrow. Docket called and cases set, and court adjourned till to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

A CHANGE.—For the first time in twelve years Alexandria will not be represented by a democrat in the Legislature. Twelve years ago M. D. Bell ran as an independent candidate, and defeated H. W. Feebrey, of the county, democrat. The last republican representatives from the city and county were O'Neal and Sybax.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The weather wisecracks foretell an unusually stormy November. Mr. J. F. Tackett has gone to New York, where he will spend the winter. A marriage license was issued in Washington yesterday to George H. Frazier, of Washington, and Mamie G. Edelin, of this city.

The alarm of fire about half past six o'clock this morning which brought out the fire department, was caused by the burning of a chimney of a house near the corner of Cameron and Henry streets.

The hawk recently seen in Warrenton with the steel trap attached to its foot, was caught by a youth, a son of a well known miller in Fairfax county, near this city. The young man has also caught three buzzards in the trap, put bells around their necks and then turned them loose.

A constable of Tyrone, Pa., is enforcing an ordinance of that borough, requiring all boys to be at their homes not later than 8 p. m. Some urchins have been put into the lockup for not complying with the law. If such a law prevailed in Alexandria the station house would present a lively scene every morning.

The State tax bills are now in the hands of the treasurer, and the law requires payment before the first of December under a penalty. As yet very few persons have paid their tax bills, and it is not known to what extent the tender of coupons will be made this year. Very many of last year's tax bills remain in the hands of the treasurer, as no settlement of taxes has been made.

This morning when three notable politicians of the Fourth ward awakened after their unrewarded efforts to elect their ticket yesterday, they found black crape suspended from the knobs of their front doors.

The tools which, as stated yesterday, were stolen from the buildings being erected on the corner of Prince and Patrick streets have been recovered at Charlottesville, but the thieves have not been arrested.

Mr. H. H. Young, Clerk of the County Court, today received a check for \$100 for the State tax for recording the deed of sale of the Alexandria and Washington Railroad.

A special train drawn by the Brooks oil burning locomotive left here today on a trial trip up the W. & O. railroad. On the train were a number of newspaper men and other invited guests.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Mr. Wm. R. Hodges, brother of ex-Mayor Hodges, and a member of the firm of Hodges Brothers, died at his home in Baltimore last night, in the sixty-third year of his age.

At Tucson, Arizona, yesterday, Gen. Miles was presented with a beautiful sword on behalf of the citizens of Arizona as a token of their gratitude for his services in the campaign against the Apaches. Gen. Miles made a graceful speech, expressing his appreciation.

Van E. Prince has been convicted at Charleston, W. Va., of forging a pension paper. He was a member of Company F, Fifth Regiment, West Virginia Volunteers, and pending his case he forged the name of Lieut. Haley to an affidavit, which forgery was discovered by the government.

A VERY UNPLEASANT COMPLICATION has arisen in a wealthy and fashionable church in Cincinnati. For some time past a woman of previously doubtful reputation has been a constant attendant at the services of this church. She has frequently been affected to tears by the sermons, and in other ways has manifested a great interest in religion. The prominent members of the church, however, and especially the ladies, are indignant at her for venturing to sit among respectable people, and the pastor has been requested to inform her that she is not wanted. Thus far she does not appear to have done this, and a number of people talk of leaving the church unless the woman is made to do so. How different from the teachings of the Saviour!
