LOCAL NEWS.

For this section fair weather, a slight rise in temperature, light to fresh westerly winds.

A BOLD ROBBERY.—A most remarkable assault, which has been kept very quiet, occurred in this city on Tuesday last. Miss Alberta V. Sisson, a teacher of one of the public schools, had gone to the Citizens' bank to deposit her salary, which she had recently received, and coming out of the bank at midday went on Lee street toward King street. When near the middle of the block she was suddenly struck on the side of the face by a man who came out of an alley. She was stunned and dazed for a moment, but saw the man run, and when she recovered she found her pocketbook gone, having felt the man snatch it from her pocket. Fortunately it did not contain a large sum. The highwayman saw Miss Sisson come from the bank, and doubtless supposed she had drawn money. The assault and robbery is one of the most notable that has ever happened in this city. Miss Sisson says that she was never on that square before in her life, and went that way as she walks the full length of King street. The square, while in the heart of the city, is rough in its pavements, and at noon, when most persons are at dinner, is entirely deserted. Miss Sisson says that when she was covered from the blow she looked on all sides, and not a single person was in view except the man who had struck her, and he soon disappeared down the hollow on the opposite side of the street. She says the man was white and genteelly dressed, and the blow she received was sufficiently severe to bruise her cheek and slightly discolored her eye, though it was given with the open hand. She kept the matter quiet through her disinclination to become a party to a trial before the police court.

STOLEN HORSE, RECOVERED.—About 5:20 o'clock this morning when Shadrach Harris, a colored driver for Messrs. W. A. Smoot & Co., went as usual to the stables at Colross, he discovered that one of the horses, a large dark roan, was missing. He at once reported the fact to Mr. Smoot, who, after examining the premises, went to the station in the city and informed Capt. Webster of the loss. Capt. Webster telegraphed to the police at Washington to keep a lookout for the horse and in a few minutes a telephonic message stating that the animal had been recovered and the thief arrested. Capt. Webster and Mr. Smoot left here on the 9:30 boat and went to the first precinct station in Washington where Lieut. Ames had the man and horse. Mr. Smoot at once identified the animal, and the prisoner, who gave his name as Henry Jewell, admitted that he had stolen it. Jewell consented to return to this city and was brought here at 1 o'clock, taken to the station house, where, after a preliminary trial, during which he confessed his guilt, he was sent on to await the action of the grand jury. It seems that Jewell, at an early hour this morning, went to the stables, got the horse, and after going a circuitous way, struck the Washington road and went to that city. There he offered to sell the horse to Wm. Kearney for \$50. After some talk he agreed to take \$40 for the horse when Kearney's suspicions were aroused and he agreed to purchase it, paying Jewell \$1 and telling him he would go after and bring him the remainder of the money. He then got a policeman and had Jewell arrested. Jewell is a tramp, about 27 years old and has been seen about the city for the past few days.

PERSONAL.—The Rev. J. Green Shackelford, accompanied by his bride, has returned to Fredericksburg. Mr. Michael M. Smith is dangerously ill at his home, on north Patrick street. Capt. Thos. Perry, of this city, who was in prison at Johnson's Island with Col. J. R. Fellows during the war, to day received a note from Col. F., thanking him for his message of congratulation on his recent election as District Attorney for New York. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kirk, of Chattanooga, Tenn., who were recently married in that city, are on a visit to their relative, Mrs. James Steiner, on Duke street. Mrs. Kirk is a daughter of John Caulder, esq., who will be remembered by many of his old friends as chief engineer of the Pioneer Mills when that establishment was in operation, and who is also now a resident of Chattanooga. Mr. Frank Lambert, of this city, and Miss Hattie Bird, daughter of Mr. H. B. Bird, of Prince George's county, Md., were married to-day. Mr. J. P. Cooper, the representative of the English holders of Virginia bonds, was in the city to-day.

IT NEVER FAILS.—After the Knights Templar banquet on Thursday night last a party of four, one of whom was a pretty auburn haired girl, left the hall together for their respective homes. It was midnight and the old saying, "when you see a red haired girl look out for a white horse," would not have been expected to hold good at that hour, but just as the quartet reached the Cameron street door leading from the hall, a carriage, drawn by two white horses drove up. There was of course a laugh at the expense of the auburn haired young lady and immediately afterwards a gentleman accompanied by his wife who also had auburn hair, came from the hall in to the street. This was a white horse for each of the young ladies, and the incident has afforded considerable amusement among their friends.

CONFEDERATE MONUMENT FAIL.—There was a large and enthusiastic meeting of ladies at the Alexandria club's rooms yesterday to organize for the Confederate monument fair. A very unique and beautiful design was adopted, and the manager of the several booths were appointed. The ladies will soon wait upon our citizens for contributions, which we hope will be cheerfully and liberally given. The Alexandria club will please accept the thanks of the ladies and the committee for the use of their rooms.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and cool with eight lodgers and no prisoners at the station house. The owners of some cows which had been taken up for being on the street were fined \$2 each. Henry Jewell charged with stealing a horse, was sent to jail.

Ramsay this evening, Mr. William Goods accidentally fell on the head, and it is feared fatally wounded an old colored man, Henry Reese. The shooting, which took place just as we were going to press, was purely accidental, and no one is more distressed at the occurrence than the young man who fired the shot.
