

LOCAL NEWS.

For this section colder, fair weather, light to fresh winds, shifting to northerly, increasing in force on the coast.

MR. VERNON AVENUE.—As stated in the GAZETTE, the Committee on Right of Way and Location of the Mt. Vernon Avenue Association left here yesterday morning, in carriages, for a ride over the proposed route. A number of stops were made on the way down to Mount Vernon, and suggestions as to the best route discussed. When the high point on the ridge about three miles south of this city was reached it was unanimously agreed that the view of the Potomac was one of the finest in the world. It was suggested that if the avenue should pass this point an observatory should be erected there, so that Washington and Mount Vernon could be seen at the same time. After leaving this point the party followed the old road for a short distance and then turned off and followed the high ridge along the river. At 1 o'clock they reached the residence of Mr. Hunter, where dinner was served. It was about 3:30 when Mount Vernon was reached, and after spending an hour there the return drive was made to this city. It was not intended that any final conclusion should be reached yesterday as to the exact location of the avenue, but a decision will probably be announced very soon. If the Memorial bridge were built one could easily drive from Washington to Mount Vernon, when the avenue is completed, in two hours. It is hoped that a good roadway can be opened all the way from Washington to Mount Vernon in a few weeks, by utilizing existing roadways, so that visitors can form an idea where the completed avenue is to be and view of the beautiful scenery that it will command.

A LOVER TO THE RESCUE.—A young lady living at the lower end of Prince street, whose father had forbidden her to keep company with the Cameron street restaurant keeper, came home last night rather late than usual, and upon being interrogated by the stern paterfamilias as to her late whereabouts admitted that she had been in the company of her Romeo. The parent, incensed that his orders had been ignored, doubled up a clothes line into a shape convenient for handling and was about to inflict a severe chastisement on the disobedient daughter, at which critical moment a sister of the young lady rushed into the street, where she found the young man, the cause of all the trouble, and acquainted him with the state of the case. The ardent lover, upon hearing what was going on, rushed toward the house, and finding the door closed threw himself against it with such force that the entire panel was carried away. Upon entering he was ordered out of the house by the irate parent, and failing to obey, a policeman was called and he was taken into custody. The case came up before the Mayor this morning, who, upon hearing the facts, dismissed the parties.

DEATHS.—Mr. Ewin E. Hulsh died of pneumonia in Philadelphia on the 14th inst., aged 72 years. He was a brother of Mr. G. H. Hulsh at The Plains, Fauquier county, and an uncle of Mr. Worth Hulsh, of this city. The Philadelphia Ledger says:—Mr. Hulsh, who was for many years in business as a master tailor on his own account, was a man of literary and scholarly tastes. He was one of the writers of considerable merit of whom the public has but little knowledge. He possessed a fine vein of humor, which expressed itself equally in private life and in his public utterances. He was a graceful speaker, too, an entertaining lecturer and a talented amateur comedian and musician. While he possessed these talents he adhered to his calling as a master of the tailoring craft, and was in all ways a meritorious man. Mr. Geo. W. Bogue, an old citizen, died at the infirmary yesterday evening, aged 55 years. He had consumption and had been sick a long time. This morning his body was taken to Mr. B. Wheatley's undertaker's establishment for interment.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.—The Board of supervisors of the county met Tuesday at the County Courthouse. Present, A. B. Grunwell, chairman; Horatio Eall and Tibbet Allen. A final settlement was made with Geo. W. Veitch, ex-road surveyor, Arlington district; a rebate of road tax on that portion of E. A. Greenough's land situated within the corporate limits of Falls Church was ordered. Several bills were passed for the support of paupers of the county, and warrants issued for the pay of county officers. The board then adjourned until Tuesday, Nov. 24, at which time the treasurer will submit his report and statement of the taxes due the county, collected and uncollected.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and cool with five lodgers and three prisoners at the station house. The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: Elgar Jackson, colored, arrested by officer Young for fighting and for resisting an officer, was fined \$3. A young man, arrested by officers Simpson and Sherwood, charged with breaking in the door of a resident of lower Prince street, was discharged. J. C. Powell, a tramp, arrested by officer Price for being drunk and disorderly, was ordered to leave the city.

DEAD.—Rev. James W. Saul, D. D., died in Philadelphia yesterday aged eighty nine years. He was a native of Pennsylvania, but settled down in early life in New Orleans, following mercantile pursuits there for years. He entered the Episcopal Theological Seminary near this city, from which he was ordained a deacon in 1860, and the following year a priest. After the war commenced he left St. Paul's Church, Richmond, and went to Philadelphia. Among the institutions to which he devoted a share of his ample means may be mentioned the Laine Divinity and Industrial School at Petersburg.

DISCHARGED.—Mr. J. W. Goods, the young man who accidentally shot and killed the old colored man named Henry Reece, on Tuesday evening last, an account of which has been published in the GAZETTE, was before the Mayor this morning, he having been bailed for his appearance. Several witnesses were examined but nothing was elicited more than has heretofore been published, and it appearing that the shooting was purely accidental and without malice or intent, the Mayor discharged Mr. Goods and the matter is at an end.

The tug Templar temporarily relieved the transfer tug Brewerton yesterday while the latter was undergoing repairs.

One night last week a fine young stallion belonging to Mr. G. C. Royston, who lives on the farm of the late A. T. M. Rust, in Loudoun, was stolen from the stable, but was recovered next day near Draesville.

The Fanchon Club gave the first of their series of dances at McBurney's Hall last night, which was largely attended by friends of the members of the club from Washington, Baltimore, Richmond and other cities.

To-day, November 17th, is the thirty-second anniversary of the memorable fire on King street, by which George Plain, J. Carson Greene, John A. Roach, David Appich, Wm. S. Evans, Robt. I. Taylor and James W. Keane lost their lives.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The opening of the stock market this morning was rather heavy, most stocks being small fractions under the closing figures of last evening. The market was again strong in the early dealings, however, advances being made over the entire list though there were slight further declines in a few stocks during the first few minutes. There was a slight reaction late in the hour, when a portion of the gains were lost. The activity fell off at the same time, but at 11 o'clock the market was firm. Money 3/4.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 17.—Virginia is consolidated 48 1/2; post-due coupons 62 1/2; 10-40s 37 1/2; new 3s — bid to-day.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, November 17.—Flour sales are of better volume and local dealers seem more disposed to buy at current figures. The grain markets for a day or two past have been more healthy in tone, but there is nothing in the present outlook to encourage speculation; fluctuations are consequently fractional; fine samples of Wheat, suitable for home milling, without manipulation, are selling at a 1c advance, while other grades are only about 1/2c higher; the usual range of prices is reported, say from 68 to 73 for damaged and common to 81 and 82 for choice. Corn is active at 49 1/2 to 50 for new, and 54 to 55 for old white; no mixed or yellow Corn has been offered for some time. Rye and Oats are firm. Eggs, butter, apples and other produce are scarce and wanted.
