HORRORS OF A REFORMATORY.—To ascertain the truth in regard to stories of cruel and inhuman treatment of female prisoners at the Indiana Reformatory for Women and Girls, Governor Gray a few days ago quietly began an investigation, which he has just finished. When he went to Indianapolis and stated the purpose of his visit the officers of the institution showed a disposition to remain in the room while the inmates were being questioned. The Governor had to ask them to withdraw, which they did very reluctantly. The prisoners talked more freely then and said that the cat-o-nine-tails was frequently used on their bare backs, and some of them bore marks of this mode of punishment. A more common form of punishment was to put a refractory inmate in a cell through the doors of which were two holes a foot apart and three or four feet from the floor. The woman's arms were put through there and handcuffed together on the outside, so that she was compelled to remain in an uncomfortable position. Sometimes she was placed with her back to the door and her hands fastened behind her in this way. One girl testified that she had been kept three days in this position. The Governor says that the punishment is far more severe than that inflicted in the penitentiary. He will recommend reform in the institution at once.

ALIVE IN HER COFFIN.—On Sunday Mrs. Able, wife of a farmer living near Oakland, Ill., apparently died and was placed in a coffin for burial. The sorrowing relatives were therefore surprised yesterday when the supposed dead woman rose in her coffin, and, perceiving her surroundings, fainted. She was removed to a bed, and there gave birth to a child. The mother and child have a very excellent prospect of life.
