Bishop Keane on Leo XIII.

Harris' Bijou Theatre, Washington, was packed from orchestra to gallery last evening, the event being a lecture by the Right Rev. J. J. Keane, bishop of Richmond, on "The Golden Jubilee of Pope Leo XIII.," in behalf of the proposed Washington University. The bishop appeared clad in his pontifical robes, spoke without notes, and was frequently interrupted by continued applause.

"No grander theme can be chosen," said the bishop, "than the character of that mighty pontiff who, holding the most sublime office on this earth, adorns it so that the whole world pays him the tribute of admiration and respect, without regard to creed, and who on being called to his sublime responsibility in one of the most critical periods of human history, when every step is fraught with momentous consequences, has fulfilled his high trust with a devotedness and lofty wisdom which may well be considered more than human. It is his connection with the epoch in which we live that the character and work of Leo XIII will best be understood. He will always be one of the landmarks of the nineteenth century, and in that light we will regard him." The speaker said that men of to-day lived in the great transitional epoch of humanity, which had its birth more than a hundred years ago, the world still struggling with its vibrations, while for fifty years around their breath, tearing lest anarchy should seize all Christendom. To those willing to see the later half of the century was bright with hope, and amid the parting clouds the God of wisdom and order was still seen sitting on his throne guiding the monarch of time. The great dangers menacing the church during the time of Pius IX were referred to at length, which arose from the exuberance of forces within society, and from the extremes to which even the best tendencies are prone to go; also from the development and assertion of popular and individual rights. Pius IX averted dangers by the issue of dogmas, the Immaculate Conception and papal infallibility, the latter remaining the world that amid the changes of human authority, the authority of the kingdom of Christ upon earth should stand as firm and unchanged as He who established it, always remaining unchanged and still changing, like the soul in man, which is affected by its environment, the church modifying its outward form to be all to all. The day of absolute government was over, and never again would a nation's laws be made by one man, or a set of men other than the agents of the people, for whose welfare alone laws should be made. The church had no desire to hinder or hamper the State in its legitimate sphere, nor should the State desire to hinder the church in her rightful province. Government to be successful must secure freedom of religion by her hold upon the affections of the people. Leo XIII, on being called to the chair of Peter, was prepared to carry on the work of his great predecessor. Although educated in the old school he was quick to see the signs of the new era, and brave enough to lift his voice and influence in behalf of the down-trodden workmen of Europe. England's wily conciliation failed in securing his influence against home rule in poor, down-trodden Ireland while the grim iron chancellor had been compelled to stop his persecution of German Catholics. The discontent of the working classes was a cause of sadness to Pope Leo, who upheld them in all legal efforts to secure their rights. The fondness of the holy father for America was dwelt on at length, where the grandest advance yet reached in the civilization of the new era had been attained. The spirit of the age was progress; not materialism, socialism, agnosticism, anarchism, atheism, which received the severest condemnation from Leo, and with which religion and society could not exist. Another cause of sadness to the holy father was the alienation existing between him and his beloved Italy, and to see Rome and Italy reduced to the level of a little power. While the official capacity of Leo commanded the respect and admiration of all men, a glimpse into his private life revealed a man without compare. The great need of the proposed university where Catholic youth would be taught the great principles of the universal church, and which received Leo's hearty approval, was dwelt on at length.

FEARFUL ACCIDENT.—A dispatch from Bathurst, N. B., says a terrible accident occurred Saturday afternoon near Caraque station, on the northern division of the Intercolonial railroad. While the train which left Caraque at 2 p. m. for Gloucester junction was near McKintosh's Cove bridge, three miles west of Caraque, the train men noticed heavy drifts of snow on the west side of the bridge. The train consisted of one passenger car, an engine, and a snow plow. Eight section men were aboard for the purpose of assisting in clearing the road of the snow which fell in Friday's snow storm. The passenger car was left on the east side of the bridge. The section men, the conductor, brakeman, a young man named Miller, the engineer and fireman, thirteen persons in all, were on the engine. They then started, but when they got on the bridge the plow and engine left the track and fell over into the river. Only five men could be found; the rest, eight in number, were pined under the engine, which was lying on bottom up in the river. The train was running slowly at the time, as they had

plenty of time when they got over the bridge to get a run at the drift. Seven of those who were on the engine were killed and the others severely wounded.


