CLOSE WORK WITH BEARS.—A party of hunters from Beulahville, Pa., returned from the woods of Clifton county a few days ago, where they had been hunting for two weeks. Last year more bears were killed in that county than in any year since its settlement. Two of the party, Dr. J. B. Neale and C. Mitchell, had a terrible adventure with two of the animals, that will sound more like the romances of the West than an incident that actually occurred in a thickly populated county of Pennsylvania. Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Neale had started out in the morning together, and in pursuing a deer in the afternoon they got farther away from the camp than they intended. Night coming on, and it being a pleasant one, they concluded to camp out. In hunting a suitable place they ran across a cave in a ledge of rocks and thought it would be just the thing. They built a fire, broiled a couple of rabbits and made a hunter's supper, after which they lay down, and from the fatigue of the day were soon in the arms of Morpheus. Late in the night they were both awakened by a noise, and each asked the other if he had spoken. Asward in a moment struck a match, and was horrified to see two large bears within a few feet of them. The brutes were as much surprised as the hunters, but notwithstanding this they made a rush for the rash mortals who had invaded their home, and in a second both hunters were in their grasp. In the encounter Mitchell succeeded in getting a large-sized clasp hunting knife out of his pocket, with which he repeatedly stabbed his bearship, but it was some time before he reached a vital part. He owes his life to the fact that the bear neither attempted to bite or claw him and devoted his whole attention to that which the girls like so well—hugging. Neale escaped in a remarkable manner. As the bear rushed at him open-mouthed, and grasped an ember from the dying fire and thrust it fairly into his mouth. This style of warfare the bear could not stand, and he turned and fled. The shock was so great that Neale fainted, and when he came to Mitchell had just succeeded in dispatching his fierce adversary. They have the skin to prove their prowess. The bear killed weighed 153 pounds.
