The bark Alenmar, from Trinidad, loaded with asphalt for Washington, arrived off the lower part of the city last night in tow of a Baltimore tug. She ran aground near the lighthouse and remained till this evening, when she was pulled off and towed to Washington.

At a meeting of the managers of the Home for Colored Men and Women Tuesday, seventy-two dollars was presented to the home by Miss Tabella Dogan, Mr. Len Dogan, and Miss Sallie Boster, being a purse for the Home which had been collected by Mrs. Julia Lucas, of New York, a native of this place, and daughter of the late Mrs. Maria Dogan.

It is said that the negroes of the Third ward will, at the next election, demand a place on the ticket, and that such ticket be headed "republican" instead of "independent", as has been the case with the tickets which they have been required to vote at the elections of the past few years.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

New York, March 24.—The stock market was again weak at the opening this morning, first prices being from 1/2 to 3/4 per cent. below the closing figures of last evening.

There was a spurt of activity in two or three stocks in the first half hour, but the general list was comparatively quiet and weak, though the losses from opening figures were confined to fractions. The decline was checked about 10:30 and a rally followed, most of the list displaying marked recuperative powers, and prices were brought back to about opening figures. There was much less activity late in the hour, though the market never became dull, and at 11 o'clock it was quiet and about steady at or near the opening prices. Money easy at 2.

NEW YORK, Mar. 24.—The weekly bank statement shows the following changes: Reserve, decrease, \$599,025; Loans, decrease, 317,600; Specie, decrease, 257,300; Legal tenders, decrease, 986,700; Deposits, decrease, 2,579,900; Circulation, decrease, 8,800. The banks now hold in excess of the 25 per cent. rule, 9,413,225.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, March 24.—Flour is firmer in tone for choice brands, with less disposition on the part of millers to sell at current figures, as they find it difficult to secure sound, flinty wheats suitable for those grades. Wheat is stronger, and sales are readily made of prime samples, but badly damaged and common lots are still handled by buyers reluctantly; sales to day at 75, 79, 82, 83, 84, 88 and 91 for very inferior to good; no choice was offered, which would bring from 2 to 4c per bushel more. Corn is more active and in light receipt at 57a59. Rye and Oats are unchanged. Eggs and other produce are wanted at an advance.

BALTIMORE, Mar. 24.—Cotton nominally quiet and steady; middling 10a10 1/4. Flour steady and quiet. Wheat—Southern steady, with light offerings; red 91a93; amber 92a95; Western steady and dull; No 2 winter red spot and March 87a 87 1/2; April 87 bid; May 89a; June 88a89 1/2. Corn—Southern higher for white; yellow steady; white 58a59; yellow 55a56; Western firmer and dull; mixed spot and April 55 1/2 bid; May 57a 58 1/2. Oats quiet and firm; Southern and Pennsylvania 35a41.

NEW YORK, March 24.—Cotton easy; uplands 9 15-16; Orleans 10 1-16; futures opened steadier and close steady. Flour quiet and weak. Wheat higher. Corn better. Pork dull at \$14 50 15. Old Meck Pork \$14 25a14 50. Lard dull at \$7 90.
