LOCAL MATTERS.

For this section warmer, fair weather, light to fresh winds, generally easterly.

THE CANNERY.—Messrs. Thomas Claggett, and others of Maryland, were in the city to-day and entered into contract for the opening of a cannery establishment here.

PERSONAL.—Mrs. Washington Danenhowet and Miss Laura Smoot, who have been spending the past six weeks in Florida, have returned to their homes in this city.

Mr. S. N. Garwood, whose serious illness has been reported, is recovering.

Mr. J. T. Vincent, of Montana, is in the city on a visit to his brother, Mr. W. F. Vincent. Mr. V. left here thirty-four years ago, and this is his first visit since that time.

Mr. J. H. Brown, formerly of this city, but more recently of Front Royal, has been appointed to a position in the Braddock House and has charge of the affairs of that hotel.

Mr. Benjamin Pauli is extremely ill at his home on upper Duke street, suffering from a stroke of paralysis.

FISH.—To-day about 100,000 herring, 100 shad and a quantity of bunch fish arrived at Fishtown. Herring sold at from \$3.50 to \$5.00 per thousand; shad at the rate of from \$25 to \$35 per hundred, and rock and perch at 30 to 35 per bunch.

DEATHS.—Mr. Walter J. Triplett, a well known young farmer of Fairfax county and son of Mr. F. F. Triplett, of Flag Hill, died at his home last night after a long illness, aged 33 years.

Brent, to look after the city's interest in the canal suit which is to come up in the U. S. Circuit Court in this city before Judge R. W. Hughes on Friday next.

BAD DOGS.—A dog supposed to be mad belonging to Mrs. George Butler, on Henry street, between Prince and Duke, and which had bitten at some children in the neighborhood, was morning shot by officer Taylor.

CASE CONTINUED.—It was stated in the GAZETTE that the case of Marshall vs. the Farmers and Mechanics' Savings Bank, which was set for a hearing before the Court of Appeals at Richmond yesterday, had been continued on account of the absence of a full court. The case is at the top of the privileged docket and will be heard at the November term in Richmond.
