LOCAL MATTERS

For this section slight changes in temperature, weather, followed by local rains, light to fresh westerly winds.

REPUBLICAN DISTRICT CONVENTION.—A number of republican delegates to the district convention assembled at Pythian Hall, this city, to-day, before the time appointed for the assembling of the convention, and after consultation determined to hold no convention here but to proceed at once to Petersburg.

Delegates appointed under the call of the State committee are not delegates to the bogus conventions called at Alexandria and elsewhere, and any delegate appointed under that call appearing in such bogus conventions, divests himself thereby of his representative functions.

The delegates who were most active in inspiring the call of a district convention, it is said, were Messrs. O. E. Hine, of Fairfax, and T. Yardley Brown, of Loudoun, and they, with others, were so panic stricken by Mahone's bold threat that they would be divested of their functions as delegates, and excluded from the Petersburg convention, that they seized the first opportunity of taking a train to Petersburg, and it is further said will be the first to see General Mahone and by timely submission to his autocratic will endeavor to secure seats in his convention.

In fact, all their opposition to Mahone's methods and plans, and all their Blaineism exuded at one little brow from the General, one dash from whose pen made "cowards of them all" and exhibited the potentiality of the boss and the political weakness of the would-be independents in his party.

Most of the other delegates finding they had been thus deserted, also stampeded to Petersburg, determining not to be left behind in the effort to consolidate the boss.

GOOD TEMPLARS.—Golden Light Lodge, I. O. G. T., held a very interesting meeting at their hall last night. Mr. McKennie, of Charlottesville lodge, the largest one in the state, and also a member of the Grand Lodge, was present, and gave an interesting talk. The committee's report in reference to the banquet to be given to those who participated in the public entertainments given by the lodge was rejected, owing to the expense.

At the district meeting, Golden Light Lodge, of this city, was represented by five delegates, all of whom made interesting reports. The district lodge decided to hold its next meeting at Centreville, and also to hold a bush meeting near Falls Church about the 1st of September. G. C. T. J. E. Miller, appointed Mr. J. L. Pettit, of this city, as District Deputy for this district.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge W. L. Clarke presiding.—Wm. Rogers vs. B. R. Summers, removed to Circuit Court of county. Stetefeldt vs. Zimmerman, referred to commissioner for report. Hurdle vs. Hurdle, referred to commissioner for report.

W. J. Young was licensed to perform the rite of matrimony. The estate of P. H. Hood, deceased, was committed to the City Sergeant for administration. J. C. Smoot was appointed a trustee of the E. F. Church South, in place of Townsend Sargent, deceased.

The various coupon cases were set for trial on Friday. Court adjourned till to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

EXPLOSION OF A FLY WHEEL.—The fly wheel of the engine which drives the saw at Mr. M. Schuler's wood yard, upper King street, exploded yesterday evening, sending fragments in every direction. One piece was forced through the wall of the engine room, and another weighing nine pounds was hurled into Mr. Frank Pollard's yard, over a fence from Mr. Schuler's premises. A small fragment struck Sandy Richardson, who is employed in the yard, crushing the tip of his toes. The engine room was considerably damaged by the explosion.

CHARTER GRANTED.—Judge James Keith of the Circuit Court, has granted a charter to the Gray Clock Company, the object of which is the manufacture and sale of clocks, watches, &c. The capital stock is to be not less than \$500,000 nor more than \$5,000,000, and the principal office is to be located in this city. The officers named in the charter are: C. C. Stevens, of Washington, president; A. W. Tongue, of Baltimore, vice president; J. Clarke, of Baltimore, secretary and treasurer; and W. H. Gray, of Frederick, Md., superintendent.

SITE.—George E. Noyes filed a bill yesterday in Washington against the Columbia Brick Company, alleging that it is using at Waterloo, in Alexandria county, a certain patent brick machine made and worked under the plaintiff's patent without his consent. He asks an injunction to restrain the brick company from the use of his patent and from making or selling any machines that are to be operated under the patented invention which he owns.

AN AGREEMENT, it is learned, has been entered into between all persons concerned whereby the property owners on Wilkes street, near the tunnel, have withdrawn their objection to the laying of the railroad switch from that street into the old foundry property recently leased to be used for a bark mill, and the switch will be put down at once. A number of men were at work to-day cleaning out the mill.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was cloudy with rain about 3 o'clock. There were three lodgers but no prisoners at the station house. The only case before the Mayor this morning was that of Wm. James and Rox Smith both colored, arrested by officers Ticer and Jones for disorderly conduct. They were fined \$1.50 each.

PROPERTY SALE.—Mr. Fred. Rogers has sold the property on the southeast corner of Cameron and Patrick streets to Messrs. F. J. Pollard and P. B. Peyton for \$1,650, the former taking the corner lot and paying \$500 premium for it. Mr. Pollard will begin the erection of a handsome brick residence at once.

FISH.—Since yesterday about 15,000 herring and 300 shad have arrived at Fishwharf. Herring sold at \$3.75 to \$4.00 per hundred, and shad at from \$10 to \$12 per thousand, and rock and perch at 25 to 40c per bunch.

In backing a train of cars on Messrs. Wm. A. Smoot & Co.'s wharf yesterday one of the cars was partially run off the end of the wharf and the truck fell overboard. The car was righted to-day but as yet the truck has not been recovered.

May flies in considerable numbers made their appearance last night.
