THURSDAY EVENING, JULY 5. LOCAL MATTERS

For this section slightly cooler, followed by stationary temperature, local rains, followed by fair weather, westerly winds.

THE REGATTA.—The annual regatta of the Virginia Association of Amateur Oarsmen was held here yesterday and attracted a large crowd of visitors to the city.

The first race was for State four-oared gigs, and the entries were: Rives Club, of the University of Virginia; University School Club, of Petersburg; Old Dominion Club, of Alexandria.

The Rives Club, at the last moment, refused to row, saying that they had never been over the course and that the heat at 3 o'clock, the time fixed for the race, was too great.

When the crew had landed and the judges' tug had reached the wharf, the following was handed on board:

ALEXANDRIA, VA. July 4th, 1888. Harry Yale, secy. Secretary of Virginia State Association of Amateur Oarsmen.

Dear Sir: In behalf of the Rives Boat Club of the University of Virginia, I protest against the hour fixed for the start of the four-oared gig race for the championship of the State and the French challenge cup, also to the decision of the chairman at the meeting held to day, that the hour for the race can be determined by the Old Dominion Club without the concurrent vote of a majority of the meeting.

The Old Dominion captain then challenged the Rives University Club to race them at 6:30 p. m. for the medals which they (the Alexandrians) had just won. This was rejected.

That as the race for four-oared gigs has been duly rowed at the hour fixed, we, as members of the Virginia Association of Amateur Oarsmen, object to any race for the French challenge cup until the next annual regatta.

President Huffey decided that the protest was a proper one and that the French cup could not be rowed for till next July. The announcement of the challenge and of the decision of President Huffey was made from the deck of the Annie Cap, Mushbach and was received with applause by the crowd on the wharf.

After doing all in their power to induce the University crew to enter a race, the Old Dominion had to give it up.

The second race was for State single sculls, and as John D. Hoop, of the Old Dominion Boat Club, rowed over the course alone he captured the State gold medal for his pains.

G. E. Sawyer, of the Potomac Boat Club of Washington, won first prize in both the senior and junior single scull races, and yet rowed over only one course. The committee decided that this might be done because there was no competitor in either class.

The next race was for double outriggers, open to only to members of the Old Dominion Club. Three crews had entered, but only two rowed. Messrs. W. E. Diemelt and F. J. Paff, and Frank Carlin and H. F. Wheat. The course was one mile in length, and the race won easily by Carlin and Wheat.

The best race of the day was the four-oared contest between the Potomacs and the Annapostans of Washington. A splendid start was made and the Potomacs took the lead at once. Up to within 500 yards of the finish the race was close, but when it was nearing a conclusion the Potomacs pulled at an increased speed, finishing four lengths ahead of the Annapostans.

No crew had entered to compete with the Potomac four in the senior four-oared race, so that crew gave an exhibition of rowing that would be hard to beat and were awarded the medals.

The concluding race was for four-oared gigs, and the competing crews were both from the Old Dominion Club. Crew No. 1 was the one which came in victorious in the first race. It was as follows: Norton, bow; Burke, 2; Lambert, 3; Blackwell, stroke; Smith, coxswain. Crew No. 2 was of slightly inferior rowing material, its members being: Hoop, bow; Wheat, 2; Waters, 3; Perry, stroke; Yohe, coxswain. No. 2 was given 50 seconds start but before the mile was reached the two boats were about even.

The wash of the steamer George Leary was caught full by No. 2, and it broke them up to such an extent that No. 1 won a race that they would probably have lost had it not been for the swell caused by the steamer.

The committee in charge of the affair was composed of Francis Huffey, chairman; Albert Bryan, J. T. Burke, L. E. Ubler and Harry Smoot. Capt. Zappone, of the Potomacs, and Mr. White, of Fredericksburg, were starters and referees. The judges on the tug were Geo. A. Mushbach, Old Dominion; James M. Durant, Annapostans; L. A. Fischer, Potomacs. The judges at the finish were L. E. Ubler, Old Dominion; Sidney H. Dent, Annapostans; T. E. Oertel, Potomacs.

Last night the Old Dominion Club gave the visitors an excursion to Marshall Hall, where the prizes were awarded by Mr. A. W. Armstrong in an appropriate speech.

The grounds taken by the Rives Club in declining to row on account of the hour fixed and the heat are said by old boating men to be untenable, as it is always left for the home club to arrange the programme of the race. It is said by many that the club did not intend to row at all, and many are strengthened in this belief by the fact that from the time their boat reached this city it was never even put in the water nor were the oars even unpacked.

The members of the Rives crew will to-morrow publish a card in the GAZETTE giving their reasons for not taking part in the race.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and warm, with four prisoners at the station house.

The Mayor yesterday disposed of the following cases: Three colored boys, arrested by officers Taylor and Sherwood, for stealing bottles from Reed's wharf, were discharged after being whipped by their parents.

Charles Smith, colored, arrested by officer Taylor for cruelty to a horse, was fined \$3.

Rebecca Penn, arrested by officer Sherwood for an assault on Emma Groves, was discharged.

The horse and coupe which was found at large on the street by officer Hayes on Tuesday, was turned over to the owner, George Scott, of Washington, from whom the team had been stolen.

The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: John Padgett, arrested by officer Taylor for an assault on John Schwab, was discharged.

A young man arrested by officer Taylor for shooting fire crackers at an officer, was discharged.

Richard Schyer, arrested by officer Brenner for fighting on the street, forfeited \$5 collateral.

Geo. Williams, colored, arrested by officer Sherwood for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$2.

RAILROAD COMPANY ORGANIZED.—The Alexandria and Charleston Railroad Company was organized at the Braddock House in this city to day. Mr. Skipwith Wilmer, of Baltimore, president, and Mr. J. R. Revis acted as secretary.

Mr. J. S. Barbour was elected president and Messrs. Eppa Hinton, Robt. Andrews, S. Wilmer, G. C. Jenkins, Peyton Randolph, C. G. Holland and J. S. B. Thompson directors.

In accepting the presidency Mr. Barbour said he did so with the understanding that he would only fill the position till the company was gotten under way, and that during that time he would use every exertion to promote its interest, but that when he entered the U. S. Senate, to which he had been elected, he did not propose to be connected with railroads.

The requisite amount of money, \$100,000, which the charter required to be subscribed before the company could be organized, has been secured. This company is the same as the Mineral Railroad Company, and it is proposed to build a road from this city to the coal fields of West Virginia.

CLEVELAND AND THURMAN FLAG.—The raising of the Cleveland and Thurman flag on the pole on Windmill Hill, in the First ward, at sunrise yesterday was the occasion of considerable enthusiasm. A large number of democrats was present and as the flag was run up to the masthead a salute from two cannons, the "Nelly Grant" and the "John S. Barbour" was fired.

Later the Drum Corps arrived on the scene and enlivened the occasion by playing several patriotic airs. The flag is a handsome red, white and red streamer, thirty-five feet long with the names Cleveland and Thurman in red letters on a white field.

A handsome American flag floated above it and a bandana surmounted both. At intervals during the day the cannons were fired, especially in the evening during the regatta. At night, after the flag had been lowered, there was a fine display of fireworks which was witnessed by a large number of citizens. The celebration of the day in the First ward was considered a success. This was the first democratic flag raising in this part of the State.

THE FOURTH AT WARWICK.—Mr. Frank Hume entertained a large number of his friends yesterday at his home, "Warwick," near this city, where the Fourth of July was duly celebrated. Among those present were several Senators, Representatives and leading members of the various professions, prominent merchants of Baltimore, Alexandria and Washington and many others.

The early portion of the day was spent in the grove, where a liberal lunch was kept constantly in view, as well as liquors of all kinds. At 3 o'clock the guests sat down to a handsome dinner, after which speeches were made by Senator-elect Barbour, Senator George, of Mississippi; Representatives Seymour, of Michigan and Mansour, of Missouri; W. H. Claggett, of Washington; Capt. H. Heaton, of Loudoun, and others. At the conclusion of the dinner the guests were invited to the lawn in front of the mansion, where they were photographed in a group.

FIRES.—The roof of Mr. Jos. H. Young's house, on Royal street, was set on fire last night by a fire cracker but the flames were extinguished by the "bucket brigade" of the Hydration company without raising an alarm.

The residence of Joo F. Byrnes, near Bull Run, Prince William county, together with its contents, was destroyed by fire on Monday night involving a loss of about \$1,000 on which there was an insurance of \$550. There was a false alarm of fire about 9:30 o'clock this morning which brought out the department.

ACCIDENTS.—While firing a small cannon yesterday morning a boy named Walter Cline was badly burned about the eyes and face by the explosion of some powder.

Mr. Frank Entwisle, while firing one of the cannons in the First ward yesterday, had one of his hands badly burned by the flash from the vent.

A little daughter of Mr. Stephen Henderson, living on south Fairfax street, was badly burned about the face last night by the explosion of some powder which had been left on the pavement by persons who had previously loaded a toy cannon, and which the child ignited with a match.

REPUBLICAN MEETING.—A number of republicans of this city met on Tuesday night last and organized a club and elected the following officers: President, Lewis McKenzie; vice presidents, Chas. Dearborn, 1st ward; R. T. Lucas, 2nd ward; L. W. Corbet, 3d ward; Thos. Bayne, 4th ward; secretary, John H. Greens. It was decided to name the club the Harrison and Morton Republican League Club of Alexandria, Va. Resolutions were adopted endorsing the platform of the Chicago convention, and pledging the support of the club to Harrison and Morton.

AGAIN ARRESTED.—Col. William R. Swallow, the confidence man, arrested in Washington about two years ago for swindling people in Fredericksburg and this city and sentenced to the penitentiary at Richmond, was released on Tuesday from that institution, but was immediately re-arrested on a requisition from Elliott City, Md., where he is wanted for swindling. He was brought through this city yesterday by Chief of Police Van Zandt, of Elliott City.

THE RAILROAD WORKSHOPS.—As stated on Tuesday Mayor Downham went to Washington that day to ascertain if the rumored removal of the Midland railroad shops from this city was correct. He saw Major Peyton Randolph who told him that some of the men employed in the foundry would be transferred to Manchester where the heavy castings for the road were now being made, but that no removal of the shops from this city was contemplated.

Mr. G. E. Price will have a fine lot of salt water trout for sale in the market to-morrow.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board will be held to night.

At the Philadelphia regatta yesterday in the four-oared gig for the Downing Cup, the Triton Club, of Newark, beat the Columbias, of Washington, by only a quarter of a second.

The meeting of the Association of Virginia Amateur Oarsmen was held in this city yesterday, and after discussing the arrangements for the regatta, adjourned to meet in Fredericksburg in March next.

The funeral of Miss Virginia Johnson took place this morning from her late residence on Prince street. The services were conducted by Rev. Geo. H. Norton, and the remains were interred in Christ Church cemetery.

A horse belonging to Thos. Fannon while being driven from Mt. Vernon yesterday evening, ran away and striking a barb wire fence was badly cut.

The U. S. Courts were opened yesterday when some orders of no public importance were entered and the Courts adjourned to day to be hereafter fixed by the Judge.

This city was visited this evening by a copious rain, accompanied by vivid lightning and heavy thunder.

At the meeting of democratic clubs in Baltimore yesterday Mr. S. G. Brent, of this city, was appointed on the committee on resolutions.

Mr. Courland H. Smith has purchased Mr. J. P. Sherwood's pair of handsome sorrel horses. Dr. W. S. Curroll, of Davidson College, N. C., and his bride are visiting Rev. J. I. Vance.

THE FOURTH OF JULY was generally observed hereabouts. Numerous parties from the city repaired to country resorts at an early hour, where the day was whiled away. The younger generation, and many of the older, amused themselves throughout the day and part of the night in exploding fire crackers, rockets, &c.
