Death in the Whirlpool.

Robert Flack, of Syracuse, N. Y., was killed yesterday in an attempt to navigate the Niagara whirlpool rapids in his life-boat. Flack went to Niagara Falls last week with his boat to race through the rapids and whirlpool to Lewiston, with Charles Percy, of Niagara Falls, who made a trip through the waters last year in a boat of his own construction. Flack thought his boat was safer, and that he could advertise himself and it by a trial trip yesterday. He was confident of success. His boat was open at the top, being half decked over. It weighed 700 pounds, and would have carried half a dozen people in ordinary water. Flack seated himself in the stern, and was strapped in by a band around his waist, holding him fast to the boat. He wore a flannel sleeveless shirt and drawers, with white socks and a handkerchief around his neck, given him by a lady in Oneida, who wanted it returned as a relic. The start was made from the Old-Maid of the Mist Landing, on the American side, just above the old Suspension Bridge, at precisely 3 p. m. Big crowds had gathered on the banks on both sides of the river and on the bridge. Before taking leave of the bystanders, Flack said: "I shall stop twenty minutes at the whirlpool—long enough for the reporters to see me—and then go on through Peter's Flats (a wicked place of water opposite the Devil's Hole) on to Lewiston. No one has ever made that trip, and I hope I will turn about twenty somersaults to prevent anybody else from copying me." The trip was a short and fatal one. In two minutes after the cast off he was in the midst of the big waves below the Cantilever bridge. Once or twice the craft overturned, but came right side up again. The third time it went over and stayed bottom up, floating past the Devereux College grounds, where stood Flack's rival, Percy, and Wm Stevenson and wife (Flack's sister), and little Willie Flack. Nothing but the keel was visible as the boat floated into the whirlpool. Here it drifted about in the eddies until it came near the shore when Percy swam out, and, with the aid of two companions, pulled the death boat in shore. Flack was still strapped in his seat, his face purple with congestion. The body was taken in charge by the brother-in-law and an undertaker. Flack was thirty-nine years old, an Englishman by birth, an engineer by trade, who had been a soldier, a sailor and a carpenter. He leaves a wife and five children. Just as Flack was starting, the president of the village received a letter from Silas M. Smith, of Syracuse, asking him to interfere and prevent the suicidal attempt, but it was too late.
