PREHISTORIC FINDS.—A stone, covered with ancient inscriptions, has been discovered in the vicinity of old Guatemala. Layers of stone containing some of the supposed human footprints lately discovered in the vicinity of Lake Managua, in Nicaragua, have been forwarded to the Natural History Museum of Vienna. The stones are volcanic tuff, and the footprints are said to be very distinct. It is proved that these impressions are genuine the conclusion must follow that man existed in Central America at a very remote period of prehistoric times.

Democratic Congress' Convention.

At a meeting of the Eighth District Democratic Congressional Committee held at the Fauquier White Sulphur Springs Thursday, August 9th, 1888, the following resolution was adopted: That the cities and counties reorganize their local committees and forward the names of the committees and postoffice address of the chairman to W. W. Scott, Secretary State Central Committee, Alexandria, Va.

Congressional canvassers have been appointed by this committee: Senatorial, city and county canvassers are to be appointed by the chairman of the respective senatorial, city and county committees, and the respective chairmen are requested to send the names and postoffice address of their appointees to the chairman of this committee.

There shall be two canvassers for each senatorial district, and each city and county respectively. Hon. E. E. Meredith, District Elector, will upon consultation make appointments in the district at such time and places as may be fixed upon by the chairman of the local committees.

The place of meeting of the Congressional convention has been changed from Alexandria city to the Fauquier White Sulphur Springs on September 5th, 1888, and delegates are requested to report there.
