VIRGINIA NEWS.

Dr. James R. Gale, of Norfolk, is dead. Special mail service has been discontinued at Avalon, Northumberland county.

Thomas E.lett, the old sergeant of the town of Ashland, died Monday night. Reports come in from all parts of Virginia of damage done to the growing crops by the recent heavy and continued rains.

Sora-hunting is now at its best in the marshes of the Appomattox, and thousands of the birds have been killed during the past few days.

The corner stone of the new Masonic Temple at Wechappaque, Northampton county, was laid on Monday in the presence of a large crowd. State Lecturer Little and other distinguished members of the order were present and participated in the impressive exercises.

The north-bound express on the Shenandoah Valley railroad was wrecked at Thomson's Station, six miles from Lexington, yesterday morning. A steel rail placed in a cattle guard by train wreckers did the work. There was a large number of passengers on the train, but no one was injured.

He had his gun resting on the ground with his hand over the muzzle, when the piece prematurely exploded, tearing away a part of his hand. He was taken to the infirmary where, this morning, Drs.
