LOCAL MATTERS

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—A called meeting of the board was held last night; present, the members except Messrs. Smith, Sawyer and Vincent. The chairman announced that it had been called to hear the report of the committee on finance and accounts relative to the proposed loan. That report was made by Mr. Leadbeater to the effect that \$5,000 had been offered by two or more persons at 6 per cent. On motion of Mr. Straus one of these bids, which seemed to be more liberal in its terms, was accepted. The committee was authorized to make the necessary arrangements, and the chairman and clerk to sign and affix the seal to the necessary notes, deeds of trust, &c.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and mild with six prisoners at the station house.

The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: Charles Kitts and a young white man, arrested by Officers Grady and Taylor, for an assault on George Chichester, were discharged, and Dan Nelson, arrested on the same charge, was fined \$5.

A police officer, arrested by Officer McCuen, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$2.50 and suspended for 30 days.

James Ball, colored, arrested by Officer Bantz, charged with stealing 30 cents, had his case continued.

Fred Branderson, arrested by Officers Tierand Jones, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$1.

DRUNK ON DUTY.—Last night while Mayor Donaham was walking on King street he saw a member of the police force, who had just arrested a small boy, come to a sudden halt, apparently unable to proceed further with his prisoner. The Mayor approaching the officer discovered that he was under the influence of liquor and could give no reason for the arrest of the boy, where upon he took from him his badge and bill and calling another officer turned the intoxicated policeman over to him, ordering him to be taken to the station house. This morning the offending officer was fined \$2.50 and suspended for 30 days.

NEW ROUTE.—It is said that the R. & D. Railroad Company are contemplating the building of a branch of the W. & O. road from Falls Church to the south end of the Long Bridge. The plan, it is said, is to start at Falls Church, run across the country to Rosslyn, where they would build a depot and furnish other facilities for the people of Georgetown, and then on to the south end of the Long Bridge over which structure the R. & D. or any other railroad has the right to run under certain conditions.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Most of the list at the opening of the stock market this morning advanced and were held throughout at small fractions above the opening figures. The activity was very heavy for the first twenty minutes, but the strength displayed soon subsided and the business fell off rapidly after that time to the dimensions of an ordinary active market.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, Sept. 13.—Flour is quiet and without change; the stocks in first hands, while not so full as usual, are well assorted, and sales are about equally distributed as to grade. Wheat is weak at a further decline of from 3/4 to 1c per bushel, but there is still a constant demand for flinty, well-cleaned milling samples, which are very seldom found among the offerings; the receipts to day were of damaged fair and good lots (none strictly choice) and sold as to condition, from 65 to 94. Corn is steady at 54 to 56. Rye active at 53 to 60. Oats 30 to 32 for Virginia; 30 to 32 for Western in car lots. Eggs 17 to 19. Butter 17 to 20. Potatoes 40 to 55. Chickens, vegetables and small fruit are dull and lower.
