Woodlawn Farmers' Club.

(Reported for the ALEXANDRIA GAZETTE.) The September meeting of the Woodlawn Farmers' Club was held at Dilworth Bank mans on the 15th inst., President Pierson in the chair. The club was late in gathering, as a number of the members attended the funeral of Dr. Howland in the early part of the afternoon. The secretary read the minutes of the last meeting as published in the ALEXANDRIA GAZETTE, and explained that they were incorrect in one particular. He had been greeted several times since the publication with such remarks as the following: "So you have been converted to free trade," "You are a low tariff man now it appears," &c. There was a general expression by members that the course of the GAZETTE deserved censure, and a resolution was proposed that effect, but the secretary counseled moderation and stated he would do the siding in this report. He now trusts that there has been enough said and that this will be printed "verbatim" for he is not willing to be committed to the low tariff doctrine. The election of officers deferred from last meeting was held, resulting as follows: President, N. W. Pierson; Secretary, W. Gillingham; Treasurer, John Ballenger. The committee of arrangements for the anniversary presented a bill of \$1.25 for printing which the treasurer was ordered to pay. John Ballenger asked if any of the members had observed a new fly on the cattle this summer. They would congregate about the base of the horns and in some instances had eaten their way through near the juncture with the skull. Some had seen them, others had not. It looked as though the deforming human was about to be taken out of human hands. The committee on live stock was requested to investigate the matter and report upon their habits and a remedy if necessary. President Pierson called attention to the death of Dr. Howland, and suggested some expression on the part of the club; whereupon the following committee was appointed for the purpose: Messrs. John Ballenger, J. W. Roberts, W. Hunter, jr. They shortly reported the following, which was adopted unanimously: "Your committee recognizes in the death of Dr. Edwin P. Howland the loss of one of our oldest and most valued members, to whom we have frequently been indebted for entertainment and pleasant instruction; we, therefore, offer the following: Resolved, that our heartfelt sympathies go out to his widow in her sorrow and bereavement. We also recommend that a copy of the resolution be given to his widow by the secretary. S. H. Buckman introduced the subject of cheat by saying that when they had sown some damaged wheat and it came up thin they had a good crop of cheat; he wanted to know where it came from. As this club has several times wrestled with this question without settling it, a suggestion was made to refer to the committee on cereals and we passed to another phase of the wheat subject by E. E. Mason suggesting the consideration of fertilizers for that crop, and called for John Ballenger's experience the past year. Mr. Ballenger stated that he used Bryant's No. 2, \$33 per ton, Susquehanna ammoniated hoes \$27, and dissolved South Carolina rock \$15. Same weight of each on different plots; on corn land manured in the spring with stable manure, he saw very little difference in the yield. S. H. Buckman said that where he had used dissolved South Carolina rock and Bryant's raw bone there was no perceptible difference in the yield of wheat, but the grass after the raw bone was much the best. He also stated that where they had wheat last year, a strip with no fertilizer was in wheat again and all fertilized alike; the strip that had no fertilizer last year was the best. John Ballenger thought there must be some limit to the profitable use of fertilizers as he doubled the quantity on a portion of his field and saw no difference. Here was a lot of knotty questions to be solved that induced some knitting of the brows, and silence ensued, which was broken by President Pierson asking the different members how much timothy seed they sowed per acre. The responses were from four to seven quarts, the majority from five to six. The question was asked, "how winter oats would do here?" President Pierson said he had sown some one year and it did very well. The next year the area was increased and it was almost a total failure, being winter killed. There being no report from the critical committee, the club, as committee of the whole, made an inspection tour, though too near night to see anything, and found things generally in a flourishing condition, the abundant rains making everything look quite green, especially the potato patch. A pen of thrifty-looking hogs and a lot of head of cattle were all in good order; a good breadth of land was being prepared for what an extensive straw stack indicated a good-sized crop this season. The next meeting will be at T. W. Blunt's on the 13th of October. Critical committee—John Ballenger, Lewis Gillingham and S. H. Buckman. W. GILLINGHAM, Secretary.
