

The Recent Corner in Wheat.

This is the way that Hutchinson got the grip on the Chicago wheat pit that enabled him to fix the price to suit himself. It has been his custom to offer to buy or to sell at that anybody and everybody wanted at the market price; or to sell at 1/2 of a cent over the market and buy at 1/2 of a cent under at the same time. The crowd, tempted by the premium at which he held September, and the belief that by selling it down they could make him drop his long wheat, have been "gunning" for Hutchinson, who kept on buying all they would sell, until the largest houses in the trade have walked into his trap and kept on selling Hutchinson's wheat for him until last week, when he showed his hand. Besides 7,000,000 bushels long September wheat he had the entire stock of No. 2 in Chicago, amounting to only 2,500,000 bushels, while the wheat arriving did not grade No. 2. He then notified the shorts that he had them, and that they could cover at the market price, which was then about 95 cents, until last Saturday, but on that day he would put it to \$1. Saturday came and with it the fulfilment of his threat. The shorts, among whom were the army of "straddlers" in all the markets of the country, wanted nothing better than selling September at three cents to five cents premium over other months in Chicago and at more than the price in New York. Then came Monday, and with it a reaction, and the shorts smiled and said, "We told you so, Hutch is running;" and they sold some more "before the market got away from them" on the down grade. They sold his September wheat down one afternoon on the curb from 98 1/2 to 94c. But before they got through Monday's market they found that Hutchinson had broken the market himself, and that his brokers had bought everything that was offered. Before Thursday's sun went down September wheat sold at \$1.25, and closed there, at which the shorts privately settled over 1,000,000 bushels sold below \$1, and at this price he offered to settle with any and all shorts, telling them the price would be \$1.50 on Friday. Those who could margin laughed and went away without covering. On Friday morning Mr. Hutchinson told them he would let them have all they wanted at \$1.50. They refused and within an hour it was put to \$1.75, with notice that the price on Saturday would be \$2. Still some doubted his word, while others were supposed to have formed a combination which will refuse to settle above a fair market price. On Saturday while Hutchinson was giving it out that he had no wheat to sell below \$2 there were anxious bidders for it at \$1.60, and Seymour was industriously buying in store lots at \$1.60. Few sales of September were made in the pit. A commission company paid \$1.60 for one small lot. Orr & Comes sold Hutchinson 5,000 bushels at \$1.45 at precisely the same time that Seymour was paying \$1.60 for it. "Old Hutch" had one of his cranks spells on Saturday morning. From some sources it was learned that he had no wheat for sale less than \$2 per bushel. The official reporters in the wheat pit were not sending out this quotation at the opening, for the reason that there were no sales at that price made openly in the pit.
