

LOCAL MATTERS

For the district fair Monday, rain Tuesday, warmer, southerly winds.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Ross Turner, formerly well known as an artist in this city is making quite a reputation for himself in his new home at Salem, Mass.

The approaching marriage of Miss Elizabeth Rogers, of Woodburn, near Leesburg, to Dr. Richard B. Fishburne, of Leesburg, is announced, the ceremony to take place at St. James's Church, Leesburg, on Wednesday afternoon next.

Mr. J. D. Howell, the city surveyor of Alexandria, is preparing a plat providing for the extension east of the eastern branch of Massachusetts avenue, Washington.

Mr. Arthur Moore, of Stafford county, and Mrs. John M. Reynolds, of Cattletts, were married at St. Stephen's church, near Washington, on Thursday last.

The State Medical Association will hold its annual meeting in Norfolk, commencing tomorrow night. The session will be attended by Drs. Powell and Ashby, of this city.

Mr. D. P. Smith, president of the Fairfax Mutual Insurance Company, who lives in Fairfax county, below this city, was stricken with paralysis on Saturday morning last.

The character of Cherrystone Light, Chesapeake bay, has been changed to fixed white, with a fixed red sector. The red sector will cover the shoal on the west side of the entrance to Cherrystone inlet, and will lie between the bearings North, 61 1/2 West and South, 21 1/2 West, embracing an arc of 208 1/2.

Someone fell through the glass door of Mr. J. T. Cox's store, on the corner of King and Washington streets, last night, and the police, supposing a burglar had been committed, searched the premises, but no one was found nor had anything been stolen.

Two ladies were brought here from Westmoreland county yesterday on their way to the asylum at Williamsburg. Their cases were very sad ones, as one of them had a family of six, and the other of seven children.

Yesterday was an ideal October day, the sun shining brightly and the air being cool and crisp. The churches all had good congregations. At night the moon shone brightly and many persons were on the street.

A bundle of clothes was lost on Cameron street, between Washington and Alfred, on Friday night last. As it was the property of a very poor woman the finder will confer a great favor by leaving it at this office.

The house of Mr. R. A. Baker, near Purcellville, Loudoun county, was slightly damaged by fire on Saturday last. The loss is covered by insurance in the Fairfax Mutual Company.

At the M. P. Church last night the pastor, in his closing prayer, asked forgiveness for "the young man and young woman who had misbehaved themselves during the entire service."

In many of the churches yesterday the ministers, in their sermons, alluded to the action of the authorities in reference to the gaming which had been conducted in this city.

John B. Alley, who figured in this city during and immediately after the war and who is at present in Europe, has had two strokes of paralysis, and his life is despaired of.

A little child of Mr. Michael Dwayne was badly scalded on Saturday evening last by upsetting a kettle of hot water which a servant had just taken from the stove.

The ladies of Clifton held a lawn party at "Tivoli" on Saturday last for the benefit of the Confederate monument at Fairfax, and were quite successful.

The democrats of the upper district of Charles county, Md., have raised a flag on which Thurman's name is put before Cleveland's.

A number of caulkers came here from Baltimore to-day to caulk the railroad transfer barge.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and cool with six prisoners and four lodgers at the station house.

The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases:

Gorham, arrested by Officer Taylor for an assault on Ed Phillips, also colored; Harriet Davis, colored, by Officer Taylor for disorderly conduct, and Thos. Cubit, colored, for an assault on John Bryant, also colored, had their cases continued.

REGISTRATION.—The registrars at each precinct in every county of Virginia will on Saturday, October 27 next, register all qualified voters not previously registered, but they can register prior to that date, and there is no necessity for waiting till then. But it will be impossible to register for the November election after October 27.

BODY REMOVED.—The remains of the late Aaron S. Coleman, formerly of this city, who died in Washington recently, were this morning transferred to the new family vault in Bethel cemetery. The receptacle is an excellent piece of work. It was constructed by Mr. Jos. Clark, and reflects credit upon Alexandria mechanism.

COUNTY DEMOCRATS.—Mr. Frank Hume has declined the presidency of the Cleveland and Thurman club, and at a meeting held Saturday night, Mr. Curtis B. Graham, jr., was elected to fill the vacancy.

Gen. W. H. F. Lee will address the voters of the county at Walker's school house, near Ball's cross roads, to-morrow night, and a large crowd is expected.
