VIRGINIA NEWS.
Col. Robert H. Armistead died Monday night, in the 85th year of his age, at his home in Williamsburg.

Mr. Max Nathan, president of the Nathan Manufacturing Company of New York, gave the annual convention of the brotherhood of locomotive engineers a complimentary dinner at Hygeia Hotel, at Old Point yesterday.

It is asserted by those who have been looking after that district coincidentally that the democrats will carry the Petersburg district both for the head of the ticket and Major Venable, the candidate for Congress. This claim is based upon a thorough canvass.

Yesterday afternoon a car driver on the Brambleton division of the street railway in Norfolk named Broadus Cuthrell, son of the late Dr. E. Cuthrell, lost his balance and fell over the front of the car and was run over. He was so badly crushed about the head and body that he died in about two hours.

The nineteenth annual session of the Medical Society of Virginia met in Norfolk yesterday and was called to order by President Dr. Benj. Blackford, of Lynchburg. Dr. H. M. Nash, of Norfolk, delivered the address of welcome, after which Dr. Wm. T. Walker, of Lynchburg, delivered the annual address to the public and the profession on the subject, "Moses and Other Doctors."

Great excitement prevails among the colored people living along the lower bay-side region of Accomack county, owing to the kidnapping of four negro boys by an oystering schooner from Maryland. A schooner, supposed to be the William McDaniel, of Crisfield, went into Pungoteague creek, and on going out early Monday morning carried off four colored boys, whom the captain of the schooner is said to have enticed on board Sunday night. The boys range from 14 to 17 years of age. Proceedings to recover the boys will have to be instituted in Maryland.

A Richmond correspondent of the New York Tribune recently sent a dispatch to that paper stating that Gov. Lee, in filling his appointments to speak in various parts of the State in behalf of the democrats, had called out the State cavalry companies to meet and escort him upon his arrival at such places. The dispatch declared that the Hanover Troop had refused to comply with this order of the Governor. Gov. Lee last night sent a telegram to the Tribune declaring the whole statement to be false. The only foundation for the dispatch is that at the points at which Gov. Lee has spoken in the campaign he has been met by mounted citizens, as was done in 1883.
