THE BISHOPS VISIT THE SEMINARY.—Yesterday will be a day long remembered by the students of the Seminary. The occasion was honored by the presence of about fifteen or twenty of the Bishops of the Episcopal Church who had accepted an invitation of the members of the faculty to call while attending the council in Washington.

WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS.—David C. Toler, charged with an attempt to commit an outrage upon Daisy Barker, in the county, and who had been committed to jail for further examination, was brought before Judge Stuart, of the Corporation Court, today and admitted to bail in the sum of \$500 for his appearance for trial on the 24th inst.

RAILROAD EXTENSION.—A dispatch from Cumberland says: "The capitalists now interested in the Virginia Central Railroad, and who returned from a tour of inspection yesterday, are more than pleased with the property. Mr. E. Karz Johnson says that the road will be extended to Washington at an early day, via the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and thence to Point Lookout, which would give Washington cheaper coal."

FAILURE IN DANVILLE.—S. Genzberger, formerly of this city but now a wholesale dealer in tobacco and cigars in Danville, made an assignment yesterday. Liabilities about \$12,000. The assets, consisting of stock on hand and outstanding accounts, are about \$8,000. The failure is said to be due to poor business and worse collections in Southern markets.


