Two young men, arrested by officers Hayes and Henry for being drunk on the street, had their case continued. Luther Luckett, colored, arrested by officer Jones for disorderly conduct, was fined \$2.50.

A CONTRADICTION.—Mr. Oliver Palman denies the statement published in Saturday's GAZETTE concerning his son, Mr. Sidney Palman, and says the charge is a blackmailing scheme; that his son was not arrested and taken before a magistrate, but a bond was given to Constable Kerby merely to ensure the appearance of the young man in case he should be wanted next Monday at Fairfax C. H. The statement, he says, that his son left this part of the country, is true only in that he visited his uncle, in Pennsylvania, for the benefit of his health after an attack of typhoid fever.

On his return he discovered that a window had been broken open and an entrance to the house obtained. Going up stairs he found that a trunk had been split in two and all the money he had, \$22, taken from it. He reported the case to the police authorities, but no arrests have been made.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The big gun shop at the Washington navy yard is approaching completion. Adie Selesman and Martin Sanborne, the two boys who ran away from their homes near Occoquan on Thursday last, as mentioned in the GAZETTE, were found in Washington on Saturday and sent back to Occoquan. They had been to Baltimore.

The Alexandria Light Infantry will hold its regular drill at their armory to night but no election for lieutenant will be held. During the performance of the "Quick or the Dead" at the Opera House on Saturday night, a looking-glass in one of the dressing rooms fell, striking Mr. L. Martell, one of the company, upon the head, inflicting a painful wound.

Yesterday was another rainy, disagreeable Sunday and many persons were kept in the house by the inclemency of the weather. The day was a quiet one. Two colored men got into a fight on the wharf this morning but they were separated before either had been much hurt. They were subsequently arrested.

The new Catholic hall on Duke street is nearly completed outside and is one of the handsomest buildings in the city.

Upper Cameron street is in a fearfully muddy condition, as are also all the streets in the vicinity of the local depot.

It was reported to day that Mr. W. W. Dungan has been stricken with paralysis at his home in Washington.
