A bailiff, who was shot dead at Coleraine, county Londonderry, Ireland, yesterday, had charge of a farm from which the tenant had been evicted.

It is said that the English experts are keeping themselves posted in a very accurate manner as to the new vessels and improved methods of the American navy.

Mr. Robert Garrett returned to his home, 'Uplands,' Baltimore county, yesterday. He said that his Southern trip had been very pleasant and that he was feeling very well.

Captain B. K. Lord rowed out upon Lake Maxinkucute, near Logansport, Ind., yesterday till a lump of lead around his waist, cut his throat and jumped into sixty five feet of water.

Col. Richard Long, who, as stated in yesterday's GAZETTE, was run over by a train and fatally injured at Pittsburg, gained prominence by capturing Belle Boy, the Confederate spy.

The House of Lords yesterday, by a vote of 95 to 77, elected the Earl of Morley, a Liberal, chairman of committees, rejecting the Marquis of Salisbury's candidate, Lord Balfour of Burleigh.

Mr. Cleveland and party arrived at Jacksonville yesterday. A delegation of citizens escorted them to the St. James Hotel, where breakfast was served. The party left for the North in the evening.

Mrs. Lottie Randie, a good looking white woman, who has a husband and two children, and Isaac Walters, a very dark colored man, who has a wife and one child, eloped from Bridgeport, Conn., yesterday.

Mr. Robert T. Lincoln has accepted the mission to England and will sail for his post on May 15. Mrs. Grant has decided to accompany her son, Colonel F. D. Grant, to Austria. They expect to sail on April 17.

Mrs. John Schubert, of Pittsburg, while getting breakfast day before yesterday, heard her 6 months-old baby crying, and, turning to its crib, saw two large rats scamper off. The rats had bitten off a piece of the child's nose and lacerated the cheek.

Two men disguised as white caps visited the residence of Mr. and Mrs. George Elmer, a mile from Washington, Pa., about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, tied them in bed, and with threats of burning the house if their request should be refused, extorted from them \$500.

At Charleston, W. Va., on Wednesday, Edward Sprigle, an engineer, put a boy named Washington off the train. Washington stole behind Sprigle a short time later and with a pump handle fractured his skull in three places. His murderer, who is only 14 years of age, was arrested.

The Inspector General of the Army has submitted to the Adjutant General a report upon his investigation into the conduct of Major Ames for tweaking Gov. Beaver's nose in Washington recently. The Inspector General prefers charges against Major Ames, and recommends that he be tried by a court martial.

It is probable that President and Mrs. Harrison will take a few days' vacation at the end of this week. They hope to embark on a revenue cutter to-morrow evening and enjoy a cruise down the Potomac river and around Chesapeake bay. They will spend a couple days on the waters, returning Monday night or Tuesday morning.

Hattie A. Dolbow, of Wilmington, Del., aged 19, who has been missing for some time, was found yesterday in Philadelphia living with Jim Foy Moy, a Chinese laundryman, and both were taken into custody. There is now a contest going on in the Delaware courts over the will of the girl's fraternal grandfather, who left a large estate.

Police Lieut. John M. Haines was held for the grand jury in bonds of \$2,000 by Judge Allford, in Chicago, yesterday, on charges preferred by Lawyer Frank H. Collier, who identified the lieutenant positively as one of the two men that lured Collier out of the La Salle Club by a bogus telephone message one night during the recent political excitement and sandbagged him in the dark.

John Justice, a desperado married to one of the Hatfield women, while sailing on the steamer Spencok, on the Sandy evening, day, tried to kiss a lady who was getting off, when John Hamilton, the clerk, interfered, and was instantly killed. Justice then retreated from the boat, covering the officers with his revolvers until he had made his escape. He will not be taken without trouble.

The British man-of-war Calliope, which escaped from Apia bay during the late war, there on March 15 and 16 by being put to sea, has arrived at Sydney. She reports leaving Samoa on the 21st, and that the United States steamer Nipsic had been floated off of the beach, natives lending material assistance. It is not likely that the Trenton or Vandal will be saved, as it is thought they were destroyed by the German navy. The German fleet has ordered the cruiser Habicht and the gunboat Wolf to be put in readiness at once to proceed to Samoa.

ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCHES.

Reputed by Settlers. DESMOINES, Iowa, April 5.—A U. S. Marshal and posse yesterday evicted a farmer from the Litchfield lands, better known as the D-smoines river lands. Blake's farm is in Hamilton county, 16 miles southeast from Webster City, near what is known among the settlers as Hell's Hollow.

When the posse reached the place they found Blake had moved his house across the road entirely off the Litchfield tract. Some of his machinery was still left, but this he was getting out of the way as rapidly as possible. The officers did not molest Blake nor offer him any violence whatever, but shortly after they arrived upon the scene a puff of smoke, a rifle crack and a whizzing bullet told them that the settlers had opened fire. The shots came from a dense thicket of hazel a quarter of a mile away. Probably forty shots were fired, but the marksmanship was either poor or the range was intentionally wide, for none of the deputies were hurt.

The posse had a number of writs, but as they were only armed with revolvers they did not attempt to serve them, but retreated in good order. There were probably twenty or thirty armed settlers in the timber. Marshal Desmond will take the matter personally in charge in a few days and will execute the writs or die in the attempt.

Boulanger. BRUSSELS, April 5.—Gen. Boulanger held a conference to day in this city with a number of his supporters in the French Chamber of Deputies. Another manifesto will shortly be issued by the General treating of the vote in Chamber yesterday sanctioning his prosecution, and appealing to the people against the government and Chamber.

PARIS, April 5.—The opportunist and radical press regard the vote in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday authorizing the prosecution of Gen. Boulanger by the government as a death blow to Boulangerism.

Count Dillon and M. Rochefort will be prosecuted by the government for their connection with the Boulangerist movement.

The Senate will begin the trial of Gen. Boulanger on Monday next. During the trial no session of the Chamber of Deputies will be held.

Strikes. BUFFALO, N. Y., April 5.—The three labor strikes in Buffalo are still on and there is no material change in the situation. One striker is under arrest for trying to force a new man to quit work. Another passenger train was derailed last night, and an attempt made to burn a box car.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 5.—The street car strike is still on and both sides are firm. The strikers are quiet. The barn men, about 160 in all, joined the strikers this morning. Last night two turn-tables on the outskirts of the city were stolen and obstructions placed on the tracks in many places. The strikers claim that roughs did the work.

Chilian Trade. WASHINGTON, April 5.—James W. Romney, consul at Valparaiso, in reporting to the Department of State upon the trade and commerce of Chili, comments upon the fact that while the imports into Chili in 1887 amounted to \$48,630,000, but \$2,200,000 came from the United States and that while over 15,000 vessels entered and cleared at Chilian ports the American flag waved over only 221 of them.

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Sudden Death. PITTSBURG, Pa., April 5.—President James Callery, of the Pittsburg and Western Railroad Company, died suddenly at his home on Hilland avenue, east end, at 8:30 o'clock this morning. Major Ames' Case. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—The Major General commanding the army has decided to recommend to the Secretary of War that Major George A. Ames, retired, be tried by court martial on charges based on his conduct on Inauguration Day and his assault upon General Beaver.

Concealed Boomers. TOPEKA, Kas., April 5.—The members of the State Board of Railroad Assessors, just returned from a trip through Oklahoma, report army officers as saying that thousands of boomers are still concealed in the buh, and that if the whole U. S. army was there it could not drive them out.

Discovery of Silver. FORT DODGE, Ia., April 5.—There is considerable excitement here over the reported discovery of silver on the farm of Peter Keaton, six miles north of this city. The vein is said to be 54 inches thick.

Collector for New York. WASHINGTON, Apr. 5.—The President has appointed Joel B. Erhardt to be Collector of Customs at New York.

Passed Over the Veto.

HARTFORD, Conn., Apr. 5.—The Connecticut Senate to-day passed by a vote of 12 to 8, over Governor Bulkeley's veto, a resolution commencing the death sentence against John H. Swift.

Resigned.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Representative Ryan, of the Fourth Congressional District of Kansas, has tendered his resignation to the Governor of Kansas as a member of Congress.

The President's Callers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—The President had the usual large number of callers this morning and was kept busy up to 12:30, the hour at which the Cabinet assembled.

CONFEDERATE PENSIONS.—Certificates for pensions for Confederate disabled soldiers and widows of such are required to be renewed before the Clerk of County or Corporation Courts, on and after April 1st. Each applicant must apply in person. These applications only apply to claims heretofore allowed by the courts.

To Prosecute Boulanger. The committee appointed by the French Chamber of Deputies has presented its report advising the House to authorize the prosecution of Boulanger. M. Paul de Cassagnac pronounced the charges against General Boulanger a tissue of absurdity and falsehood. He declared that the real arbiter between Boulanger and the government was universal suffrage. After speeches by other members a vote was taken on the question of sanctioning the prosecution, and the Chamber by a vote of 355 to 103 decided in favor of prosecution. The French government is endeavoring to procure Boulanger's expulsion from Belgium, and should it succeed, the General, it is reported, will go to London.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL. The business outlook has but slightly improved. Money matters are unchanged. U. S. bonds are steady, while State securities are but little sought for and quotations fluctuate very slightly. The provision markets are generally quiet and receipts of produce small, with scarcely any speculative feeling. The fishing season has opened rather early and the catch so far is fair.

NEW YORK, April 5.—The stock market opened with a moderate volume of business which was not so closely confined to a few shares as usual of late. First prices, with few exceptions, were from 1/2 to 3/4 per cent. higher than last evening's figures, but the improvement was not maintained in the early trading, and everything retired small fractions, though the losses were in no case for more than 1/2 per cent. Later in the hour the entire list rallied and prices were quickly brought up above the opening figures all around. The rise continued till the end of the hour, but there was no special feature, and at 11 o'clock the market was fairly active and strong at small fractions better than the opening prices. Money easy at 3/4.
