LOCAL MATTERS

For this section light local showers, followed by warmer, fair weather on Saturday, westerly winds.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—At the meeting last night a bare quorum, consisting of Messrs. Aitchison, W. F. Carne, Fendall, Leadbeater, Mankin, Marbury and Vincent, was in attendance. Mr. Marbury was elected chairman pro tem, and the minutes were read and approved. On account of the small attendance the election of a chairman was postponed, Mr. Marbury being authorized to sign warrants as chairman pro tem.

Mr. Leadbeater, from the Committee on Finance and Accounts, reported several bills, which were ordered to be paid. The superintendent presented the resignation of Florence Chapman Jackson, saying that she had married and gone away without giving the slightest notice, or sending in her monthly report, and moved its acceptance, which was carried. He also presented the application of D. B. Sledge for the place so vacated, and on his motion she was elected a substitute and he was authorized to place Halliwell School No. 2 temporarily in her charge, it being now, he explained, taught by a pupil of No. 1.

At the suggestion of Mr. Wm. F. Carne his proposed amendment to the by-laws was laid over until the next meeting. Mr. Vincent called attention to the claim of Mr. Gibson, who he said, was now paying interest on the money withheld on contract in consequence of the non-action of the board.

On motion of Mr. Aitchison it was ordered that when the board adjourn it adjourn to meet on Thursday next at 8 p. m., it being understood that if a report on the subject should not then be made the board will proceed to arrange the matter itself.

Supt. Carne stated that the amount required to pay teachers and janitors for next session would be \$14,000, and that the board could not safely call on the city for less than \$12,000 without impairing the efficiency of the schools, the numbers in which are increasing rapidly. The clerk gave the amount necessary for incidental expenses, and both were referred to the committee on finance and accounts, which is to report to Council.

REVIEW OF THE PAST.—In its description of the parade in New York on Wednesday the Herald said:

Friendship Engine Company, of Alexandria, Va., which formed part of this division hauled behind them a machine with which the Father of His Country must have been familiar, as the company was organized in 1774. The members say, indeed, that George Washington was their first president and gave them their first engine. The old relic was destroyed by vandals during the war, and the machine that succeeded it was the one displayed Wednesday. One of the company carried the first pipe ever used in Alexandria, which does not differ much in shape from those now in use. Huffer about the engine were buckets that used to be passed from hand to hand in Alexandria in extinguishing fires before engines came into fashion. The company was commanded by Captain of Police James Webster, and Mayor E. B. Downham, of Alexandria, accompanied them to this city. They were forty strong, wore red shirts, white fire hats and blue caps.

The Friendship engine is not the antiquated machine the Herald would lead one to suppose, as it was built only a few years before the war.

THE TICKET NOT COMPLETED.—Another meeting of the republicans and independents was held last night with Mr. H. M. Foltz in the chair and Mr. Joseph Crupper secretary. The meeting again failed to complete a ticket, and adjourned till a number of persons whose names had been suggested could be definitely heard from. The ticket, however, so far as agreed upon, is the same as that published in the GAZETTE, though some change will probably be made in the Council ticket. Mr. James McCuen was endorsed for Council in the Fourth ward. Last night, when the meeting adjourned, it was generally understood that in case the others who had been requested to become candidates failed to do so Mr. W. A. Moore will be supported for Mayor and Mr. L. M. K. Bell for Auditor.

It is understood that Mr. Jos. Broders last night declined to become a candidate for Mayor, and to-day Mr. Bell informed a reporter of the GAZETTE that he refused to allow his name to be used as a candidate for Auditor.

TROUBLE ON THE MIDLAND.—Five of the men employed in the Midland yard in Lynchburg quit work yesterday morning on account of the company discharging Mr. Thomas B. Hannegan, the yardmaster, for directing the men to "cut loose" cars in the yard, which is a direct violation of one of the rules. The Advance says: "Mr. Hannegan informed a reporter that while such procedure in shifting cars was in violation of the rules, it was almost absolutely necessary, and the plan pursued by yardmasters has been in the employment of the Midland Company for nine years, is said to be one of the best yardmasters in the State, and an evidence of the value of his services was his engagement by another company as soon as his discharge was known."

To-day it is learned that other men were employed in the places of the strikers, and for some time it appeared as if trouble would ensue, but the police appeared on the scene and quiet now reigns.

PERSONAL.—Rev. G. W. Nelson, of Warrenton, will hold mission services at Grace Church, this city, commencing on June 10. Francis H. Hill, of Madison C. H., Past Grand Master of Masons in Virginia and at present District Lecturer for District No. 3, is at the Bradlock House. He is here visiting the Lodge in his official capacity.

In mentioning the appointment of Mr. Norton as Judge of the Corporation Court of this city the Loudon Mirror says: "He is clear-headed, deliberate, and of unquestionable uprightiness; he is industrious, painstaking and thorough, while to his fine natural talents he adds the acquirements of a successful large career and subsequent years of careful study. That he will make a just and upright judge, as well as an able one, we have no doubt, and we take this opportunity of tendering our congratulations to our excellent friend, Judge Norton."

COUPONS.—It was stated in the GAZETTE a few days since that every liquor dealer and a majority of the merchants of this city had this year tendered coupons in payment of their State licenses. The license tax in this city amounts to \$15,000 and it is said that of this amount \$11,000 has been paid to the city treasurer according to the requirement of the State law—both money and coupons being placed in his hands until the coupons are verified in court. By the use of coupons the tax-payers here save 30 to 35 per cent. on their bills.

Luther Anderson, colored, of Fairfax, has contracted to carry the mail between Fairfax C. H., Vienna and Langley, six times a week for one year, for \$350.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.—In the case of Effie M. Wright against Wm. F. Wright for a divorce the defendant has filed an answer in Washington. They were married in this city, August 9, 1880, and she charged that the day after the marriage her husband left her and moved to California, but returned in the November following, and he then commenced a course of ill treatment and abuse. She asks alimony and to resume her maiden name of Effie M. Lane. The defendant, in his answer, admits the marriage, but denies the charges.

FALLS CHURCH DEMOCRATS.—At a meeting of the democratic electors of this district, held pursuant to call May 2, at Bailey's X Roads, the following nominations were made: Supervisor, George K. Pickett; Road Commissioners, George Auld, James M. Mason, and B. E. Shreeve; Justices of the Peace, Truman Abrams, Frank P. Berkeley and Joseph S. Riley; Overseer of the Poor, John W. Lynch; Constable, W. B. Howard. Remarks were made by several gentlemen urging vigilance to insure the success of the ticket.

STRUCK BY A TRAIN.—John Hill, colored, of North Carolina, who was employed as a lineman by the Western Union Telegraph Company, while under the influence of liquor, sat on the side of the railroad track, near the cemetery, last night, and the step of a passing car struck him on the head and split his scalp, inflicting a serious but not necessarily dangerous wound. Dr. Smith had the man taken to the station house, where his wounds were dressed by Dr. Jones.
