ENGINEER YOUNG SUSPENDED.—Mr. B. Wheat, Fire Warden from the First ward, yesterday notified Mayor Downham that Mr. Joseph H. Young, engineer of the Hydraulion steam fire engine, was under the influence of liquor and unable to discharge the duties of engineer. Mr. Wheat advised Mr. Young's suspension and the appointment of some one else in his place.

Before the Mayor acted in the matter there was an alarm of fire and the Hydraulion passed him on the street with Mr. Young, still under the influence of liquor, at his post. Mayor Downham stopped the engine to have Mr. Young taken off, when he was informed that there was no fire. He then suspended Mr. Young from duty and placed the engine in charge of Policeman Bontz, who is a practical engineer. Some of the members of the Hydraulion company interfered in the matter, but Mayor Downham paid little attention to them other than to insist that his orders were carried out, so Mr. Bontz took charge of the engine and will act as engineer till the matter is finally settled by the Fire Wardens. Mr. Young's excuse for being in the condition in which he was found on the occasion of yesterday's celebration.

ANOTHER CHARTER.—Judge Norton today granted a charter of incorporation to the Washington Real Estate Company. The object of the company is to acquire, hold and dispose of and improve real estate in Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia. The capital stock of the company is \$120,000, to be divided into shares of \$60 each, and the principal office is to be in this city. The officers named are J. H. Walton, president; H. E. LOCAL BREVITIES.

Mrs. W. H. Adams died last night at her home in the Third ward.

The Fairfax farmers are putting their threshing machines in order for the coming harvest.

The old brick building on the north side of Commerce street, near West, is being demolished.

It is reported that Mr. Brown will contest the election of Mr. W. B. Dobbie as Superintendent of Police.

The commissioners of election of this city met this evening and certified to the election of the officers as published in yesterday's GAZETTE.

In the election table published yesterday the vote of Mr. A. F. Cox in the Third ward was printed 692 when it should have been 592.

Bertie Baggett, the little daughter of Mr. B. F. Baggett, who lives on upper King street, was this morning painfully burned in the face by the explosion of a big powder cracker.

Mr. R. T. Lucas, auctioneer, to-day sold for Mr. Warrington Gillingham, trustee, three hundred acres, part of the Gunston Hall estate, to Col. Edward Daniels, for nine thousand dollars.

The Fairfax Mutual Telegraph Company, which controls the line from Fairfax C. H. to Vienna, is going to extend the same to Burke's Station. The Warrenton, Plains and Alexandria telephone line is being repaired.

The market to-day was largely supplied with all things in season and prices were moderate. The demand for asparagus exceeded the supply, and strawberries were not as plentiful as was expected. They sold at 10 to 15 cents per box.

One of the elected municipal officers, residing on upper Prince street, was most vigorously applauded by the procession as it passed his house yesterday. Gov. Lee participating freely, to the delight of the recipient of the demonstration.

The banquet given at the Braddock House yesterday was a very fine affair and an evidence of the ability of the present proprietor, Mr. Orison, to ably and abundantly supply the taste of the most fastidious. All who participated spoke in the highest praise of the entertainment.
