A Duel.

Three or four days ago a party of three men from Boston were reading an article which appeared in one of the Norfolk papers not a very long while ago, and a discussion arose over the article. As a result of the discussion one of the men made a remark about the women of this section of the State which was anything but complimentary. The remark was overheard by an old gentleman who resides in this vicinity, and though he was cautioned not to take any notice of the remark, he at once did so. He approached the party and stepping alongside of the one who had made the remark he said: "I heard your conversation just now, and I pronounce every word of it a lie of the deepest dye, and no gentleman would utter such words." The party who had made the remarks about our women said, "The cap fits." The old gentleman replied, "You are a liar." The person addressed then struck the old gentleman with a stick. The old gentleman then said, "You are a young man and I am old enough to be your father; now, if you call yourself a gentleman (which I don't, and I belittle myself by making you this proposition) equalize the difference between us as to physical strength and go with me a short distance and we will settle the question."
