LOCAL MATTERS

For this section fair weather, preceded by light rain on the coast, stationary temperature, south-westerly winds.

Mr. MCKENZIE.—A writer in the Washington Press thus speaks of Mr. Lewis McKenzie, of this city:

"The ante bellum leaders are rapidly passing away. Younger and more active men have come to the front, and if there are still living some of these who molded public opinion in the fifties, few of them occupy public positions or apparently take a very keen interest in political affairs. There are, however, exceptions to every rule. I saw one an hour since. A man above the average height and rather heavily built, and whose age must be at least 70. A clean-shaven face, blue eyes—which never seem at rest—looking anxiously at you through a pair of near sighted spectacles. In the old days of Virginia this gentleman was a power in the politics of his State. Before the war the Hon. Lewis McKenzie was invincible in Alexandria before the people. He defeated some of the most prominent citizens of the town for the legislature. It was he who conceived the idea of connecting Alexandria with the inexhaustible coal regions of West Virginia, and it was through his influence that the bill creating the Alexandria, Loudoun, and Hampshire railroad, now the Washington and Ohio, was passed. Of this road Mr. McKenzie was for years the president. When the war came on, although a large majority of his party and personal friends espoused the cause of the south, he stood by the Union, and was, upon the occupation of Alexandria by the federal forces, elected its mayor. When the late Gov. Walker ran against Gen. Welis Mr. McKenzie espoused his cause. By the conservative party he was elected to the forty-first Congress. Since, while not seeking political preferment, he has been a consistent republican and fully alive to the issues of the hour."

CHARGED WITH ABDUCTION.—Mr. Geo. W. Taney, of Pottsville, Pa., arrived here yesterday evening on the lookout for his eighteen year old daughter, Maggie, who he said had been abducted by John N. Haure, on the 12th of May last. Accompanied by Lieut. Smith he went to Woodbridge, below this city, near which place, living with Mr. Riley, he found his daughter and Haure living together as man and wife. All returned to this city this morning and proceeded to the station house. The girl said she had not been abducted, but had followed Haure voluntarily. The latter said he intended marrying the girl, but finding he could not get a license in Virginia had postponed the matter till they could get back to Pennsylvania. He agreed to go back with the girl and have the ceremony performed at once. After some consultation this was agreed upon and the party will leave here for Pennsylvania this evening. Haure is a good looking young man and a needle maker by trade. All the parties appear to be highly respectable people.

PERSONAL.—Miss Daingerfield, sister in law of Senator John S. Barbour, will go to the Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs in August. September will be spent at Poplar Hill, Maryland, which has been in the family of Miss Daingerfield for a great number of years, and is one of the handsomest country places in Maryland. Among those who received the degree of bachelor of laws at the commencement exercises of the law department of Georgetown University, in Washington, Monday night, were William C. Wibert, of Alexandria county; Richard W. Johnston, of Arlington; Chas. W. Alexander, of Brents ville, and Fielding Lewis, of "Marmion," King George county. Andrew J. Green, of Fredericksburg, received the degree of master of laws.

Miss Mildred Lee, daughter of General Robert E. Lee, is a guest of Mrs. Fitzhugh Lee, at the Governor's mansion in Richmond.

Mr. J. H. Clibbester, treasurer of Fairfax county, is seriously ill at his home in that county.

Jas. Hill, colored, having served his term in jail for malicious cutting but not having paid the fine imposed, was released.

Crump vs. Rudd, exceptions placed to the report of commissioner of sale.

Joe S. Beach qualified as a justice of the peace for the city.

The criminal docket, except the cases of Richards and Nelson which are to be tried at the next term, is now clear.

The grand jury, which has been in session since Monday, returned the following indictments, viz: W. J. Brodbeck, G. W. Petty, Eldorado House, J. Crilly, J. Rice's estate, Geo. Bator, W. P. Woods, L. Brill, jr., and Patterson & Co., all for selling liquor on Sunday.

The grand jury was then adjourned till to-morrow morning to which time Court adjourned.

THE G. A. R.—A large and enthusiastic meeting of the Pennsylvania association was held last night at Grand Army Hall, in Washington. Resolutions were passed thanking Assistant Secretary Basse for the sentiments expressed by him at the memorial exercises in Baltimore, in which he denounced the speeches made by General Lee and Mr. Daniel in this city on the occasion of the unveiling of the Confederate monument. A series of resolutions were also adopted authorizing a reprint of Gen. Rosser's speech made in S. Anton last week, and directing that a copy be sent to every G. A. R. post in Pennsylvania, accompanied by resolutions denunciatory of the sentiment.

ENGINEER YOUNG REMOVED.—A meeting of the City Fire Wardens was held yesterday evening at which all the members of the board were present. An order was passed removing Joseph H. Young as engineer of the Hydraulion engine. Mr. Young has been under suspension since the 24th ult., for being under the influence of liquor. The secretary of the board was directed to notify the Hydraulion company of the action of the wardens. No election was young into to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Young's removal, so Mr. William Bonitz will remain in charge of the engine for the present, at least.

LIGHT CORN CROP.—Information received from the neighboring counties is to the effect that there will be a short corn crop this season. The late heavy rain falls washed up much of the corn that had been planted and in other instances the ground became so packed that the corn failed to sprout. Numbers of farmers have been compelled to replant but the unseasonable weather has kept many others from doing likewise until it is now too late to plant corn, and, as above stated, the crop is expected to be a light one.

THE FRIENDSHIP FIRE CO.—A called meeting of the Friendship Fire Company was held last night to make arrangements to attend the funeral of their deceased member, Mr. Henry Herbner. The company decided to attend the funeral in full uniform. A committee of three was appointed to draw up resolutions of respect to the memory of the deceased member. The funeral will take place to-morrow at 9 a. m. The engine house has been draped in mourning.

THROUGH TRAINS AGAIN.—The work of repairing the damages along the line of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac railroad has been completed, and yesterday evening trains from Richmond commenced running direct to Washington. The schedule in effect prior to May 31 has been resumed. All the roads that were damaged by the recent floods are now running as usual.

REMOVAL.—The office of Major C. M. Borum, the assistant general freight and passenger agent of the Midland road, will be removed from this city to Lynchburg on Monday next. The removal was to have been made on the first of the month, but the damage done to the road by the flood delayed matters. The five clerks employed in the office in this city will go to Lynchburg.

MUSICAL ASSOCIATION.—The Alexandria Musical Association held a meeting last night and elected 18 new members. To admit all these the limit of membership had to be raised. The association decided to give an excursion the 18th of July.
