**A Brutal Father.**  
Albert Gogler is a beetle browed German carpenter living in New Haven, Conn. He has a daughter, Annie, aged eighteen, who has worked as a servant for Mr. D. W. Whistler, who keeps a boarding house. She is a good, honest, industrious, but not over brilliant girl, and Mrs. Whistler speaks very highly of her. Wednesday night Gogler called at Mrs. Whistler's, and harshly demanded that Annie accompany him home and after finishing up her work she went. Her father began to upbraid her for having left her former employment at Engineer John J. Hackett's, at No. 35 Rosette street. She left that place because Mrs. Whistler offered her \$1 more per week than Hackett paid her. When they reached home Gogler locked all the doors and then demanded the money she had earned during the week. This she told him she could not give him as she had left it at Mrs. Whistler's. Then he roughly threw her to the floor and kicked her and told her that he would lock her in a room all night. She finally went to bed and told her father that she wanted to be released early so she could go to her work in the morning, as she had to prepare breakfast for the boarders. This he sneeringly promised to do. Next morning at 3 he went into her room with a short, black-necked whip, and stripping the clothes from her body he flogged her on the back and limbs until she fainted. He went away and when she recovered she washed the blood from her body and went back to Mrs. Whistler's. It took her an hour and a half to go the two miles and when she reached there she was so exhausted that Mrs. Whistler had to put her to bed. Dr. Converse found welts as big as his thumb on her back, shoulders and limbs. He says he never saw a human being's body in a more pliable condition.

Prosecuting Attorney Daily and Dr. C. B. Adams, of the Connecticut Humane Society, took the matter in hand, and a warrant for the arrest of the brute is out. The girl is his child by a former wife, and since her mother died she has been as near like a slave as is possible. It will be some days before she will be able to leave her bed.

**KILLED A SEA SERPENT.**—Capt. William F. Smith of the bark Nautilus, at Panama, reports that when off Cape Berkeley, Galapagos Islands, a sea serpent was seen about thirty yards from the vessel. Capt. Smith estimated the serpent's length at eighty feet, and he was about as large around as a barrel in the thickest part. The head was shaped like a snake's, only on the extreme end of the upper jaw there was a ridge or bunch. The head was about three feet in length, and about two feet back of the head was a mane of hair. No fins were seen. The tail was long and tapering and shaped like that of a eel. "We all had a good view of him," says the Captain, "while he was slowly crawling toward the ship. We loaded two bomb guns and banged away at him for about fifteen minutes there was quite a circus, the serpent lashing the water with his tail and running his head out four or five feet. At last he ran out his head, whisked around, and sank. Dead. Bomb hit him. When he went down he was not more than twenty feet from the ship, and so, of course, we had a good look at him. We spoke the bark Bertha, Capt. Jenkins, a few days later, and she told us that a large serpent was seen off Redonda Rock by Capt. Jones, in the Camilla, several years ago."

**WON \$200,000 AT POLICY.**—A sensation was created at Vienna a few weeks ago by a certain M. Farakas winning \$200,000 in the Government lottery. Farakas played five numbers, and backed his opinion in several different government offices in Vienna. Five numbers are daily drawn out of ninety placed in a glass urn. On this day the numbers drawn were the five which Farakas selected. He went to the Treasury Department, showed the tickets, and demanded his \$200,000. So large an amount of cash was not in the office, but the Minister of Finance promptly secured a loan of the amount from a bank, and Farakas went off rejoicing with his 480,000 florins in crisp new notes packed in a leather bag. It now comes out that Farakas won through an ingenious trick, and that he employed confederates. The latter, a young woman and a boy, have been arrested, as has also Farakas. This circumstance may result in the overthrow of Austria's Government policy shops.
