### Herrmann Duped.

Professor Herrmann, the prestidigitator was victimized a few days ago by a clever confidence man. The Professor was roped into buying some stock in a patent car brake scheme, and paid out \$625. He is of the opinion that the man who duped him has left the country. While traveling from Pittsburgh to Philadelphia a man, who occupied a seat in the same drawing-room car with Professor Herrmann, introduced himself as Mr. Lighthall. After talking about the Professor's business the stranger commenced to tell all about his own. He pretended to control the patent for a new and ingenious brake for cars on cable railroads. It was the biggest thing going, according to the stranger's story, who predicted that all cable systems would be forced to adopt it as a matter of economy and safety. Mr. Lighthall had with him a model of the contrivance which was to render surface railroading absolutely safe. He showed the "eight-inch" man what a slick thing it was, and made him believe that it was more ingenious than even the Professor's tricks. So persistently did he talk of the brake that Herrmann finally became infected with some of the enthusiasm of his new acquaintance. When they separated Mr. Lighthall said he was going down to Washington to attend to some business, and expected to meet some of the men to whom he had parted with some of his stock. He regretted that he had not met the Professor before, but said he would try to get a refusal of a little stock for him. If he succeeded he was to let Herrmann know about it. A few days after that Mr. Lighthall telegraphed him that it was all right, and then called at his office in the Broad Street Theatre, Philadelphia. Professor Herrmann did not see anything strange in being let into so big a scheme on very easy terms, and gave his check for \$625 to the Bank of the Metropolis, in New York, and received 200 shares of stock in exchange. The Professor made a present of the stock to his wife. She examined the certificates when they were on the train coming to New York and thought there was something wrong, for the whole thing seemed to be a scam. Mrs. Herrmann said so much about it that the Professor took the certificates to the bank as soon as he got in New York and asked the bank people to find out how much the stock was worth. According to their estimate it was valueless, and then the Professor got mad because he had been taken in. He ordered the bank to stop payment on the check he had given for the stuff. But that did not amount to anything, for Mr. Lighthall had no difficulty in getting the check cashed by the proprietor of the Continental Hotel in Philadelphia, where Prof. Herrmann stops when in that city. When he found that his \$625 was as good as lost the Professor went to Inspector Byrnes, of New York, and told him about the case, and asked him to catch Mr. Lighthall if he could. At last accounts nothing had been heard of him.

### COUNTERFEITERS CAPTURED.

Chief Bell, of the Secret Service, has received a telegram from Agent M. G. Bauer, dated Cincinnati, September 3d, saying that he had arrested George W. Williams and James H. Clark, at Alexander Station, Ky., for dealing in and manufacturing counterfeit silver dollars. A large quantity of counterfeit money and material was found. Clark is a trackman on the Kentucky Central Railroad, and Williams and Clark made the counterfeiters at the latter's house. Williams is an old-timer. He procured a flatboat on the Ohio river last fall, and with several hundred dollars of counterfeit money, he started down the river. He gave to Jacob Kull and Charles Maxfield a quantity of counterfeit silver dollars to pass in the State of Indiana, while he remained with the boat, which was tied up to the bank, and arranged with Kull and Maxfield that if they did not return in a certain number of days he would know that they were arrested, and in that case he would skip. They were arrested at Newport, Indiana, and 81 counterfeit silver dollars were found on them. Williams did skip, and until a few months ago, has been hiding. Lately he was located at Clark's, and when Bauer had sufficient evidence against Clark and additional evidence against Williams he arrested them. Williams made an excellent counterfeit, and would make as much as \$1,000 before he would dispose of it, and then to dealers only.
