Sick or We'll

Mr. J. H. Connelly, formerly of this city,  
now of New York, writes:

"A curious novelty in business enterprise  
is being conspicuously advertised all over  
the country. It is an 'association' to furnish medical at-  
tendance and drugs to its members at 'bed-  
rock' prices and even below. For 40 cents  
per month the association guarantees com-  
petent medical attendance. And this medi-  
cal 'combine' professes to have arrangements  
made at good reliable drug stores, in all  
parts of town, by which prescriptions will  
be filled at a uniform cost of 20 cents each,  
no matter what ingredients they may con-  
tain, for the association's members. Well,  
it is by no means improbable that at that  
price prescriptions, taking them as they  
run, would still pay a large profit to the  
pharmacists, whose ordinary percentage of  
profit is from 300 to 800 per cent. There are,  
of course, some few rare chemicals and cost-  
ly drugs that could not be made up in ap-  
preciable quantities at any such figure, but  
they are very little required, and doubtless  
it is understood that the association's phy-  
sicians shall not call for them, or if they  
do, that they shall strike a good gen-  
eral average by turning in a lot of pre-  
scriptions that will not cost over a  
cent each to fill. Latin is a fine cloak for  
such rams. But all this is of course mere  
speculation. The scheme of the concern  
may be honest enough and its practice may  
have no perceptible effect on increasing the  
bills of mortality. Surely some device is  
wanted to fill in between the charity of the  
dispensaries and the robbery of fashionable  
medical practice, by which people of moder-  
ate means can have and pay for medical at-  
tendance when they are sick. Some Her-  
brew societies have a rather ingenious sys-  
tem for getting their doctor's bills down to  
a minimum. They contract with a physi-  
cian, by the year, to attend all cases of il-  
lness among members and their families for  
a certain stipulated sum, which is paid,  
whether anybody needs a doctor during the  
year or not. Of course, in a sickly season  
the physician might feel that they were  
rather getting the best of him, but, after all,  
he would only be called upon to skip around  
a little more lively and be more anxious to  
effect cures than if he were charging by the  
visit. Indeed, the thing of charging by the  
visit for medical attendance is the weak  
point in the relations between the doctor  
and patients. It is his interest to keep  
them sick as long as possible. So clearly is  
this recognized by many of our practical  
old headed business men—who have money  
enough to enable them to do as they please  
—that they now follow the example of the  
Hebrew societies and engage the services of  
their physicians by the year, paying whether  
they and theirs are sick or well. Accouch-  
ments are as a rule excepted from such  
contracts, as they are too good plumbs  
for family doctors to let go into a general  
account. The annual terms of such con-  
tracts run all the way from \$250 to \$2,500.  
It is an excellent arrangement for the doc-  
tor, who with a few such good contracts on  
his hands can be easy about his income, and  
it is good for the patients, as it is clearly  
the interest of the physician to keep them  
as well as possible to save himself trouble.  
The next better thing is the Chinese system  
of hiring the doctor by the year and stop-  
ping his salary whenever his patient is sick.  
It will be a sad day for druggists and under-  
takers if that plan ever gets a foothold in  
this country."

HALIFAX'S GREAT DRY DOCK.—The largest  
graving dock in America was formally  
opened at Halifax, N. S., on Friday by  
Vice Admiral Watson, commanding the  
British fleet in North American waters. On  
the docking of Her Majesty's ship Canada  
there was a brilliant gathering at the opening  
ceremony. The site of the dock is at the  
end of the harbor adjoining Her Majesty's  
dock yard. The dock is 601 feet long and  
78 feet wide, with 30 feet of water over the  
sills. It will take in the largest vessel  
afloat. The whole work was built of con-  
crete and granite. It is subsidized to the  
extent of \$600,000 by the British, Canadian  
and Halifax city governments. This dock  
will be of great service to the Imperial go-  
vernment, and will undoubtedly result in the  
transfer of England's naval headquarters  
from Bermuda to Halifax.
