FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—A collision occurred at Run-by Branch, between Clifton and Manassas, on the Midland road, at 4:30 o'clock this morning between north-bound and south-bound freight trains, resulting in the killing of two men, the injuring of five others, the wrecking of both engines and a number of cars, and the killing of a number of head of cattle.

The collision occurred between the second section of train No. 21, engine No. 580, north-bound, Conductor J. W. Rollins and Engineer James Fitzgerald, and the second section of train No. 24, engine No. 537, south-bound, Conductor G. S. Marshall and Engineer Edward Kemp.

The north-bound train was composed chiefly of cattle cars, nine of which were wrecked and, as above stated, a number of the cattle killed.

The south-bound train was made up of cars containing general merchandise, five of which were wrecked and their contents scattered along the road.

The accident was the result of a misunderstanding of orders by the train men, and when the collision occurred both trains were running at their usual rate of speed.

The killed were Fireman James Murphy, of Fairfax county, and Brakeman C. F. Eates, of Orange. Their bodies were taken to Culpeper and this evening will be brought to this city and turned over to Undertaker Demaine for preparation for burial.

The injured on the north-bound train were Engineer James Fitzgerald, of this city, hurt about the face; Brakeman E. L. Payne, extent of injuries not known but not thought to be serious; Fireman Frank Evans, slightly bruised, and a cattle shipper named Higginbotham, cut about the head. All the above named were taken to Manassas, where they were made as comfortable as possible and are receiving the best surgical attention.

Engineer Edward Kemp, of this city, of the south-bound train, was cut about the head, but his injuries are not thought to be dangerous. He was taken to Clifton, where he is receiving the best possible attention. Both the killed were on the south-bound train.

As soon as news of the accident was received here a wrecking train was hastily made up, and in charge of Superintendent J. S. B. Thompson proceeded to the scene. On the train was a Dr. O'Brien, of this city.

As soon as the injured were cared for and the bodies of the dead recovered the employees of the company went to work clearing the track, which was badly blocked, and by 4 o'clock this evening sufficient progress had been made to allow the passage of trains.

ANOTHER CHARTER.—Judge Norton has granted a charter of incorporation to the Ebbitt House Hotel Company. The object of the establishment, conducted, &c., of the hotel business in Virginia and elsewhere. The capital stock is \$100,000, divided into shares of \$200 each, and the principal office is to be at No. 123 south Royal street, in this city. The officers are E. S. Stellwagner, president; G. E. Hamilton, secretary and T. M. Gale, treasurer, all of Washington. In this connection it may be stated that Caleb C. Willard, who has for a number of years been proprietor of the Ebbitt House, in Washington, is about to retire from the hotel business. He has leased the hotel and appurtenances to the above named company represented by Messrs. Burch and Gibbs, both of whom have been identified with the Ebbitt House during the past decade.

THE OPERA HOUSE.—That charming actress, Miss Adelaide Cherie, will appear at the Opera House next Saturday evening, in the great play "Only a Farmer's Daughter." Miss Cherie is known not only as a fine actress, but as a very beautiful woman. She is also a magnificent dresser, and the costumes she displays are marvels of the dress-maker's art. TRAMPS IN A CHURCH.—Shortly before dark yesterday evening a tramp was seen to enter the First Presbyterian church, on south Fairfax street, which has been closed for the past few weeks. An officer was sent for who, with some gentlemen living in the neighborhood, made a search through the building but no one could be found, though the door was found to be open. It is believed that the tramp, with others, had been sleeping in the church for several nights past, and that he was preparing to spend another night there when his plans were frustrated by the discovery by the neighbors. How he escaped from the church is not known.

The Mayor has ordered out the chain gang to clean the streets and hereafter all tramps arrested in this city will be made to do duty on the gang.

LEN HORSE AND BUGGY RECOVERED.—Detective Thos. Barrington and Mr. W. J. Schuler came here to-day from Baltimore and recovered a horse and buggy that had been stolen from the latter in Baltimore last week. It appears that John and George Mitchell hired the team from Mr. Scharf on Thursday, promising to return it in three hours. Instead, however, they came here and, by false statements, got Mr. R. T. Lucas to sell the horse and buggy at public auction. Mr. M. Schuler became the purchaser, paying \$70 cash for the team. John Mitchell was arrested in Baltimore yesterday, when it was learned what he had done with the stolen property, but his brother has not yet been found. After Mr. Scharf recovered his team, which he valued at \$225, he paid Mr. Schuler \$35—one half the amount he had paid when he bought it at auction.

A CHAPEL FOR ARLINGTON.—Quartermaster General Halbird says he will submit to Congress a plan for a mortuary chapel to be erected at the western entrance to Arlington Cemetery, in this county. According to estimates the chapel, which will be composite in architectural design, will cost not less than \$50,000, and if authorized to be built will be used for funeral and other ceremonies at the burial of members of the Grand Army of the Republic and other men who die in service or who have died after serving their country.

DEER.—The Manassas Gazette says: "Mr. David A. Rixton reports that there were two deer among the stock on his farm, near that place, during the past week. He says he could easily have shot them, but thought they had escaped from Mr. Robert Porter's park near Manassas." What were probably the same deer were seen near Leesdell last Saturday night and were shot at by several persons.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

A fine horse belonging to Mr. R. H. Haverdier died last night.

The funeral of Mrs. John Stephenson took place this morning from the M. E. Church South and was largely attended.

Mr. Albert Wilcoxon died at his home at Fairfax C. H., Friday last, after an illness of several weeks, aged 66 years.

The sale of the Chantilly farm in Fairfax county advertised to take place on Monday last, was postponed till December 14th.

A marriage license was issued in Washington yesterday to Luther Aldridge, of Loudoun county, and Jane Ennis, of Fairfax county.

The hop to be given at McBurney's Hall to-night by a number of the ladies of this city to their gentlemen friends promises to be a most enjoyable affair.

John Whiting, an old and well known colored citizen, known as "Captain Jack," died at the almshouse on Wednesday, and was to-day buried by the colored masons, of which body he was a member.

The alarm of fire shortly before 9 o'clock last night, which brought out the fire department, was caused by the burning of the chimney of a house on Pines street, near Peyton, occupied by a colored man named Cornelius Morris. The engines did not go into service.

The tramps arrested in this city on Sunday and who were taken to Richmond on Wednesday were yesterday committed to jail there for the action of the grand jury. The pistols, &c., found on them were identified as the property of Mr. J. H. Valentine, whose store was burglarized last week.

MONEY AND COMMERCIAL.

Money matters in the cities are quiet with a plentiful supply, while in the country there is still great complaint of a decided scarcity. Government bonds are steady but dull. Virginia bonds quiet but coupons are a little more active and will probably continue to improve now that taxes are due and payable. Railroad securities are in very little demand and quotations are nominal. Business is still dull though as the holidays approach the retail trade is brightening.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The stock market was active this morning, and the strength of yesterday continued, which resulted in materially higher prices for most of the stocks traded in. First prices were generally from 1/8 to 3/8 per cent. higher than last evening's closing figures, and these gains were further supplemented by fractional advances during the hour, the upward movement extending to all portions of the list though it was slow. There were freer offerings toward the end of the hour and the market began to recede, some of the list being carried below the opening figures, and at 11 o'clock the market was still active and barely steady, generally at close to opening prices. 
