How to Cook Sausage

Sausage is a popular article of diet during the fall and winter months, and is an enjoyable article if well cooked. One of the disagreeable features about it is the ordinary mode of cooking, which is to fry them. The spattering fat covers the range and the ascending smoke fills the house with a disagreeable odor. This may be avoided by simply putting the sausage in a baking pan and cooking them in the oven. In this way all disagreeable smoke and odor are avoided. This is given on the authority of an experienced caterer, who says that a pound of sausage will cook brown in ten minutes. He also says that a good way to cook sausage is to split them in two, lengthwise, place them between a double wire broiler and broil on the flat side first, then turn and broil on the other; arrange sausage upon it and serve.
