Good Templars.

ROANOKE Va., Dec. 3.—Delegates to the Grand Lodge of Good Templars of Virginia are arriving on every train, the counties of this State, wherever the order has been established, being all represented. Among those in attendance are the following: Co. Geo. W. Carter, of Ashland; John Gray, eq., of Leesburg; Hon. J. M. Thorne, of Falls Church; Judge McCabe, of Leesburg, and Messrs Geo. W. Hawhurst, of Falls Church; Chas. H. King, of Front Royal, and Geo. H. Hayden and J. Fred Birrell, of Alexandria. The Grand Chief Templar, Col. J. R. Miller, arrived last night and opened the lodge. The other officers being present occupied their respective positions. Mr. John Gray, of Leesburg, is prominently spoken of as the next Grand Chief Templar. The Grand Secretary, Geo. W. Hawhurst, it is thought, will not have any effective opposition. Mrs. A. J. Pye, of Richmond, is spoken of as a candidate for Vice Templar, for J. C. McKee, of Charlottesville, for Grand Counselor, and Miss Mary McArmen, of Danville, for Superintendent of Juvenile Templars.

The Good Templars have sustained losses during the year, but their present membership is 7,965, with 186 lodges. Total receipts for the year, \$4,022.99; expenses, \$4,283.16. There has been a net loss in both lodges and membership, as is seen by the report, and it is believed that the decided non-partisan feeling prevailing among the delegates will inspire the Grand Lodge to reaffirm its principles decided upon at the session of 1886. The delegates from Alexandria, Messrs. Birrell and Hayden, are well cared for at Rock Park, and were yesterday driven in a carriage to all the points of interest in the city and the water works in the county, at the foot of Mill mountain. The spring at the foot of this mountain supplies the city with water, it being 6 feet deep and 100 feet long. The mountain is about 600 feet above the level of the city, and the coming summer an excellent hotel will be erected on its summit. The delegates from Alexandria are indebted to Mr. Maupin, a prominent real estate agent of this place, for his trouble in conveying them through the different mountains surrounding Roanoke. H.

LARGEST FLOWER IN THE WORLD.

In the farthest southeastern island of the Philippine group Mindanao, upon one of its mountains, Parag, in the neighborhood of the highest peak on the island, the volcano, Apo, a party of botanical and ethnographical explorers found recently, at the height of 2,500 feet above the sea level, a colossal flower, says the *Gardner*. The discoverer, Dr. Alexander Schadenberg, could scarcely believe his eyes when he saw, amid the low-growing bushes, the immense bud of this flower, like gigantic brown cabbage heads. But was still more astonished when he found a specimen in full bloom, a five-petaled flower nearly a yard in diameter—as large as a carriage wheel, in fact. This enormous blossom was born on a sort of vine creeping on the ground. It was known by the native who accompanied Dr. Schadenberg, who called it *bodo*. The party had no scale by which the weight of the flower could be ascertained, but they improvised a swinging scale using their boxes and specimens as weights. Weighing these when opportunity served, it was found that a single flower weighed over 22 pounds. It was impossible to transport the fresh flower, so the travelers photographed it and dried a number of its leaves by the heat of a fire. Dr. Schadenberg then sent the photographs and dried leaves to the Royal Botanical Gardens, Breunau, where the learned director immediately recognized it as a species of *Rafflesia*, a plant formerly discovered in Sumatra, and named after the English Governor, Sir Stamford Raffles. The new flower was accordingly named *Rafflesia Schadenbergii*. The five petals of this immense flower are oval and creamy white, and grow around a center filled with countless long violet-hued stamens; thicker and longer in the fertile flower than in the infertile.

THE MIGHTY ARMIES OF EUROPE.

Statements vary as to the magnitude of the army which Xerxes brought with him from Persia for the overthrow of Greece, but even if Oriental imagination is allowed to dwell upon the figures, this array would be smaller than the armies that several of the modern European governments can now call out in case of need. A complete mobilization would give to France an army numbering between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 men. Indeed, some recent authorities have estimated that, under the new military rule, in a few years more the number of men who would be directly connected with the army, or connected with its military operations, would not fall short of 4,000,000 Germany could now put into the field an army of 2,650,000, which will doubtless be increased by the proposed changes in the military law to more than 3,000,000. Austria has prepared for war a force numbering about 1,300,000. The Italian army, upon a war footing, numbers about 2,500,000, while the Russian army has resources in troops which amount up to 5,000,000.
