Israelite and Indian.
As stated in the GAZETTE Saturday, Col. Garrick Mallory, of the Smithsonian Institution, who is recognized as the authority on Indian traditions, religious and languages has just completed a contribution to science, that is likely to cause considerable stir in geological circles. It is entitled "Israelite and Indian, a parallel in Places of Culture," and was written for the American Association for the advancement of Science, of which he is vice president, and chief of the anthropological section. In this report Col. Mallory overthrows and completely demolishes a popular and almost universal theory that all the savage tribes of America, before their contact with civilization had a formulated and established religious faith, believed on a single supreme being, a future life and a system of rewards and punishments after death. This theory, which has been accepted and disseminated by religious missionaries of all denominations among the Indians, has been the chief link to connect them with the pre-historic races of the Mosaic era, and, at the same time, has been used to demonstrate that man, as a creature, however ignorant or degraded, was divinely inspired with a revelation or an instinct that recognized the one Supreme Being, the immortality of the soul, and hope of happiness or fear of misery after death, according to his worldly life was spent.

Colonel Mallory reports that after years of investigation into the traditions of all the North American tribes, representing fifty-eight linguistic stocks and more than 300 languages, he has been forced to the conclusion that the aborigines had no such instinct and no such religious belief until after contact with European civilization when they gained it from the missionaries. These mission-aries, he says, were imbued with the dogma, and sought and therefore found evidence of one primeval faith, but were misled by their own enthusiasm. He continues:

"After careful examination, with the assistance of experienced linguists, I reassert my statement that no tribe or body of Indians, before missionary influence, entertain, formulated or had distinct belief in a single overruling 'Great Spirit,' or any being that corresponded to the Christian conception of God. But I freely admit, with even greater emphasis, that an astounding number of customs of the North American Indians are the same as those recorded of the ancient Israelites."

He tells, too, of the experience of W. W. Warren, who translated Bible history for the Ojibway Nation, and was invariably met with the remark from the native priests: "This book must be true, for our ancestors have told us similar stories generation after generation since the world was new," and only last year, when a well-informed chief of the Muskogian was being questioned as to the religious myths and legends of his tribe, he replied: "They are all in the Old Testament. We can read them there without the trouble of taking them down from our people."

Colonel Mallory also argues that it is useless to attempt to christianize the Indians until after they have been civilized.

BOILED TO DEATH—A peculiarly horrible death occurred at Kokomo, Ind., Friday night, which created a sensation. George Tykle, an eccentric character, has been running a bath house in that city for several years and claiming a wonderful efficacy in his baths in the cure of all kinds of maladies. Among his patients was John Clarke, an old farmer living near town and who was afflicted with paralysis. He had been for some months taking one or two baths a week at Tykle's rooms, and Friday evening Tykle put him into a bath—'till at 8 o'clock and left him to himself, while he engaged in revelry with some companions. Tykle finally went to bed and forgot his patient whom he had left in a hot bath, with the gas burning beneath the bath-tub. He found Clarke Saturday morning dead in the water, with the skin all cooked off his body, as well as portions of flesh. He was literally boiled to death, being powerless to help himself out of his awful situation. He had a family of growing children, and was about seventy years old. Tykle is in jail awaiting the result of the coroner's inquest, which will be held to-day. He has always been considered very eccentric.

Two pretty convent girls were arrested in St. Louis yesterday and taken to police headquarters to await the arrival of relatives. They are Josie Merrill, of Galesburg, Ill., and Lillie Adkins, of Kansas City. Ten days ago Miss Merrill and Miss Adkins, neither of whom is 17, packed up their wardrobes, scaled the walls of the convent, and were seen in St. Louis. They had money, and spent it freely. They put up at the Lindell, made the acquaintance of some young men, and patronized the theatres.
