PHOTOGRAPHIC LANTERN.—The photographic lantern is the name of a new device by which a photographic artist claims to be able to project upon a screen or wall, not mere fixed objects, but scenes of life and movement, such as are observed on the white table in the camera obscura. The invention includes a peculiar sort of photographer's camera of about a foot square. The instrument is pointed at a particular moving object, and by turning the handle a number of photographs are taken every second. These successive phases of a scene in movement are then converted into transparencies and placed in succession upon a long strip, which is wound on rollers and passed through the photographic lantern, with results which appear to be similar to the well known philosophical toy, the "zoetrope."

THROUGH SIBERIA.—Russian civil engineers are in Ottawa, on their way from Japan, by way of British Columbia, to Montreal. They were sent to Canada by the Russian government to inspect railway construction there, in view of the proposed building of a great railway through Siberia, which, with waterways, will give Russia complete communication between St. Petersburg and the Pacific Ocean. They chose the Canadian Pacific Railway as a model on account of its great length and of the marked similitude of British Columbia's mountain regions and the plains of Manitoba to those of Siberia.
