TO PICKLE OYSTERS—Take one gallon of oysters opened to their own juice without the least water added, strain and seal the liquor over a slow fire; skim, put in the oysters a few at a time, as they burn quickly; boil for a minute or two and lay on a sieve to drain until all are done. Spice the liquor with mace and salt, or with whole cloves, whole allspice and a very little cayenne pepper also. Scald again and add one pint of white wine and one pint of vinegar; pack the oysters in jars; strain the liquor over and seal up.
