VIRGINIA CONFERENCE.—The Virginia Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, which meets in this city next Thursday, is one of the oldest of the conferences that occupy the old and settled fields of Methodism. It is an offshoot of the Baltimore conference, and, while growing healthfully, has not yet arrived at the size and importance of the present body. It began its organization with less than twenty preachers. There are now sixty-three names on the conference roll. These with the official laymen and general conference visitors will make a body of about seventy-five men who will participate in the deliberations of the conference. Besides the routine, the conference will consider the propositions set down from the general conference for changes to the second restrictive rule of the discipline. The proposed changes involve the ratio of representation in the general conference, and the admission of women to that body. It will require the assent of three fourths of all the annual conferences and a two thirds majority in the general conference to make either change. Bishop J. N. Fitzgerald, the presiding officer, is one of the new bishops elected at the last general conference. He is about 52 years of age, tall and angular in person. He was educated for a lawyer and was admitted to the bar in 1855. Three years later he was converted in a powerful religious awakening which occurred in the Central M. E. Church, in Newark, N. J. With his conversion came the conviction of a call to the ministry. His superior pulpit and pastoral abilities early attracted the attention of the church, and he was assigned to important charges. He held the office of recording secretary of the missionary society at the time of his elevation to the episcopacy. The conference session will last probably till the following Monday night or Tuesday morning.

THE 22ND OF FEBRUARY.—The only public celebration of the day was the usual one by the Cadet Corps of St. John's Academy, which has been interrupted but once during its twenty years of existence, and then by reason of a severe storm. As many of the cadets have just recovered from influenza, and some are still unable to stand a march, one company only paraded, under the command of Captain W. F. Carne, jr., but that made a very creditable appearance, though a little out of its usual file drill in consequence of the rainy winter, which has made outdoor drill infrequent. The banks and government offices were closed, as was the postoffice from 10 a. m. till 5 p. m. None of the stores closed, however, and business went on as usual. This morning at sunrise Captain Webster read Washington's farewell address from the steps of the Friend-ship engine house, and, closing with the exclamation, "Let her go," threw to the breeze the new flag recently adopted by that company. The vessels and steamers on the river were decked with bunting, and flags were flown from several houses in the city. At 12 o'clock the bells of the city were rung. To-night the Columbia S. F. E. Co. will give a grand supper in honor of the day at the Opera House restaurant.

COUNTY ROAD MEETING.—As stated in the GAZETTE, at the citizens' meeting held Wednesday night in the county to discuss the question of issuing bonds for making stone roads, the report of a committee recommending the issue of \$75,000 bonds was voted down after an elaborate discussion of the subject, the needs of the county, and the great benefit good roads would be. A resolution was adopted requesting Mr. Hume to have enacted a law empowering the Board of Supervisors to increase the road levy so that it should not be less than 15 nor more than 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of property; also a resolution imploring Delegate Hume to urge upon the legislature the necessity of formulating some plan at this session of settling the State debt. A committee of five was appointed to take into consideration the matter of the removal of the court house to a point within the limits of the county.

OPERA HOUSE.—The Pearl of Savoy last night by the New York Theatre company was presented to a large audience and gave much satisfaction. To-night the company closed their engagement here, presenting the beautiful Irish drama "Kathleen, or the Dream of St. Patrick's Eve," Miss Lillian Mortimer appearing as Kathleen.

The Night Owl Burlesque Company, comprising twenty female artists, will appear here Monday night, opening with an elaborate spectacle introducing every artist of the company, and terminating with a grand operatic march. The numerous scenes and acts, dancing and vocalism are said to be of the highest order, and the sketches of fun and frolic, feasts and jests of humor are completely up to the times.

THE CANAL-RAILROAD LEASE.—The bill providing for the lease of the C & O canal to the Washington and Cumberland Railroad Company passed the Maryland House yesterday by a vote of 65 to 15. The bill will now go to the Senate. That body will next week wrestle with the canal question. The Senate finance committee, it is said, will give this bill an early favorable report. The bill to amend the charter of the Washington and Cumberland Railroad Company passed the House and will go to the Governor or for his signature.

There are now at the Theological Seminary, near this city, eleven students in the senior class; seventeen in the middle class; ten in the junior class and twenty-one probationary students.

STREET PAVING.—The Committee on Streets met last night and considered the advisability of having Patrick street paved from Cameron to Oronoco street—three squares. The work will probably be ordered to be done. The committee was also informed that the property owners on north Alfred street will soon petition to have that street paved. The committee and the city engineer will meet on north Alfred street on Monday evening to consider the petition of certain property owners to lower the curb recently set on the street between Princess and Oronoco.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Dr. Chas. Maningerode, of this city, has been selected by the Lee Monument board to deliver the prayer at the unveiling of the Lee Monument in Richmond on May 29th, 1890, and has accepted the invitation.

State Auditor Marye was in the city today.

Mr. Willie Sauerthal continues to improve.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and cool with three lodgers and no prisoners at the station house.

The mayor this morning disposed of the following case: James Beach, charged with violating the police regulations at the local depot, had his case continued.

INJUNCTION.—Mr. J. R. Caton today entered suit in the U. S. Circuit Court, for the South Bend Iron Works, of Indiana, against Benj. Bowring, of Fredericksburg, for the infringement of a patent, and to enjoin him from the further manufacture and sale of the Oliver plows.

THE CHARTER GRANTED.—The charter of the Southern Investment Company, J. H. Luma and others, which was held in the Corporation Clerk's office till the tax recently imposed by the State on charters should be paid, was today granted by Judge Norton, the tax having been paid by Mr. J. R. Caton, who is named as the resident counsel for the company.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

At Occoquan Mr. J. A. Marshall is loading six barges with ties for Philadelphia and Mr. L. A. Clarke three.

The Virginia Boat Club, of Richmond, have elected Mr. W. F. Tinsley a delegate to the annual meeting of the Amateur Oarsmen's Association of Virginia.

Commencing to-morrow the train for Quantico on the A. & F. E. W. now leaving here at 6:10 p. m. will hereafter leave at 3:15 p. m. The train for Richmond leaving here at 4:32 p. m. will take on no passengers between this city and Quantico. The train from Richmond arriving here at 10:42 p. m. will stop to let off passengers taken south of Quantico.

In Washington yesterday the police, on a telegram from Woodbridge, Va., arrested two young tramps and locked them up to await further instructions. They had a silver watch marked "J. T. McKee," and say that they found the body of a dead man lying beside the railroad track and took the watch from the pocket.

Mr. Priestly Blozham, the West End weather prophet and egg dealer, observing that the new moon is on the north side of the pike—his sign for cold weather—during the past few days has bought about 2,000 dozen eggs, and already the price has advanced from 2 to 3 cents per dozen.
