

LOCAL NEWS. MONDAY EVENING, MARCH 3.

For this section warmer, fair southerly wind. Virginia M. E. Conference. Religious services began at 9 a. m. conducted by the Bishop. The Conference was then called to order and the journal read and approved.

R. F. Bishop read the report of the board of stewards, and, after some discussion, the board retired to arrange for a rehearing. The statistical secretary read his report, a part of which is as follows: Probationers, 1,787; full members, 7,090; local preachers, 22; deaths, 87; children, 214; adults, 219; number churches, 134; value, \$109,850; parsonages, 20; value, \$16,675; paid for building, \$6,062 (paid on old indebtedness) present indebtedness, \$5,761; current expenses, \$1,098; Sunday Schools, 153; officers and teachers, 1,252; Sunday School children, 7,286; missions, \$1,543; church extension, 313; Sunday School Union, \$33; tracts, \$21; for freedmen's aid, \$35; education, \$62; American Bible, \$16; Woman's Missionary, \$32; ministerial support, \$10,790; conference claimants \$62.

The conference voted that the missionary sermon be preached to-night at 7:30 o'clock by G. R. Nessa. The following reports were read: Episcopal fund, auditing committee, temperance (this report was recommended) and freedmen's aid. The conference stewards reported and the report was adopted. The report on Sabbath observances was also submitted. The temperance committee re-committed their report which was amended by J. S. Wickline and was then adopted. Mr. Rust, representing the Society of Deacons in the M. E. Church, was introduced.

The conference adjourned to meet at 3 p. m. The doxology was sung and the benediction pronounced by Rev. J. J. Rumbaugh. The session this evening was principally devoted to the reception of reports. The closing session of the conference will be held to-night at 7:30. After the conference missionary sermon the appointments will be read. Rev. Mr. Bishop, it is understood, will remain here.

AMATEUR OARSMAN.—The annual meeting of the Virginia Amateur Oarsmen's Association was held in Fredericksburg on Saturday, and was presided over by the President, Mr. W. S. White. The delegates in attendance were Mr. Harry Yeh, of the Old Dominion of Alexandria, Mr. W. F. Tinsley and Mr. S. C. Wortham, of the Virginia of Richmond, and Mr. W. H. Hunkamp, of the Rappahannock of Fredericksburg. The reports of the secretary and treasurer were received and approved. Rule No. 20 of regatta rules, which says that the time and order of races shall be submitted to the council, was amended by the words "contesting crews" being inserted in the place of council. The amendment also provides that no crew not entered should vote. The time for the holding of the annual regatta was fixed for June 15 and Richmond the place.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing term: President, W. S. White, of the Rappahannock; Treasurer, Ashby Miller, of the Old Dominion; Secretary, F. L. Hill, of the Virginia. THE OPERA HOUSE.—To-morrow evening Mr. Martin Hayden will appear here in his successful drama "Held in Slavery." The Petersburg Times says: "Held in Slavery" is a rich melodrama, full of comedy, patterned somewhat after the style of "The White Slave." It is full of thrilling scenes and lively action, assisted by several realistic features.

A benefit will be given the ushers and stage hands of the Opera House at that place of amusement on Wednesday night next by the Alexandria Minstrels. This is an amateur company, but is said to comprise some very good talent. Among the specialties which will be introduced will be a musical sketch by Messrs. Wm. Harper, A. B. Travis, O. A. Travis and Wm. Seal, in which Mr. Harper will give several solos on a number of year-powder bottles of different sizes.

PERSONAL.—Mr. B. Callender White, a native of this city but now of Shreveport, La., has been appointed supervisor of census for the second Louisiana district. Major S. P. Bayle, of Fauquier, who was recently appointed a special census agent to collect statements of recorded indebtedness of the State, has entered upon the discharge of his duties. He is now at work in the clerk's office in this city. Capt. R. P. Leary, U. S. N., has been suggested as chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks to succeed the late Commodore White. Gen. J. B. Gordon, General Commanding United Confederate Veterans, has appointed Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, of Virginia, Lieutenant General of the United Confederate Veterans and Thomas H. Carter, of Virginia, Assistant Adjutant General.

AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH yesterday the pastor read the financial statement for the year 1889, from which it appeared that the new Lyceum hall, costing \$9,000, had been entirely paid for and that the parish was free from debt, with a balance of \$970 in the treasury, most of which will be applied to the purchase of furniture and fitting up of the hall. The congregation comprises about 1,400 persons, of whom 150 are colored, and is probably better equipped than any other in the diocese, having a large church, a fine pastoral residence, two large buildings for school purposes and the new hall for its young men, besides maintaining its parish schools for both white and colored children. Much of this is due to the energy and business capacity of the rector, Rev. Father O'Kane.

COUNTY COURT.—Judge D. M. Chichester presiding—Com. vs. Thomas Taylor, Great Smith and Benj. Jones, indicted for assaulting and robbing Frederick A. Eckstein of one double-barrel gun. Plea of abatement entered; demurrer overruled. Counsel for Taylor asked a separate trial; granted. Jury called and case in progress. Col. F. L. Smith, and Messrs. John Greene and S. G. Brent, for prisoner, and James E. Clements for Commonwealth. An order was made submitting to the Board of Supervisors the sum of \$500 as a proper amount for building a new bridge over Four Mile Run at Seminary crossing.

THE DIRECTORS of the Falls Church Mutual Fire Insurance Company met at Falls Church on Saturday and elected John W. May, of this city; John B. Dutton, of Loudoun, and J. R. Jones, of Fairfax C. H., directors in the company. The company has been in operation less than two months and has nearly two hundred thousand dollars worth of property insured. The officers are Geo. W. PRIZE FIGHT.—A fight with skin gloves between Mike Reidy and John Collins, both of Washington, was arranged to take place near this city to-day and the sporting fraternity were all on the alert. The police boat with several Washington officers on board guarded the District territory and this evening came here to gather information of the fighters. The Mattano which arrived here at 3:30 o'clock reported that the prize fighters and their friends, who were in a boat, landed at Bryan's Point, near Marshall Hall, about 2:30 o'clock. Alexandrians were informed that the fight was to take place either near the Driving Park, or the Distillery this evening.

ROBBERY.—The store of Mr. C. C. Berry, on King street between Fairfax and Royal, was entered on Saturday night last, and \$17 of \$87 that had been left in a book in a desk in the back part of the store was stolen. The entrance was made by breaking off the bolt of the back door, and it is very evident that the thief knew all about the arrangement of the store and where the money was kept. Last night the store was entered again, but so far as known nothing was stolen.

YESTERDAY was cold and blustery, but the sun shone most of the day. The churches all had fair congregations and most of the pulpits were occupied by ministers of the Virginia Methodist Conference now in session here. Bishop Fitzgerald preached in the morning at Trinity Church to a large congregation. In the afternoon at the same church the ordination of the deacons elected by the conference took place, and at night Rev. W. C. Webb, of Philadelphia, preached.

FIRE DRILL.—During a visit of Supt. Carne to the schools in the Seaton building this morning the fire alarm was suddenly sounded and, in less than four minutes, all the boys, about 300 in number, were in the yard with their books, etc. The drill was conducted without the smallest confusion, and will undoubtedly be the means of saving lives should a fire really occur, of which, however, there is small danger in any of our schoolhouses.

QUALIFIED.—Mr. Lewis McK. Bell, the recently appointed collector of customs of this port, late on Saturday evening last qualified before Mr. J. R. Cason, notary public. To-day Mr. Bell filed his bond for \$10,000 in the Clerk's office, Messrs. L. McKetzie and Park Agnew becoming his sureties. Mr. Bell has not yet received his commission and will not take charge of his office till that document is sent him.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and cool with seven lodgers and no prisoners at the station house. The mayor this morning disposed of the following case: Henry Charlton, charged with disorderly conduct, was ordered to leave the city. On Saturday night fourteen lodgers were at the station house.

HANDSOME SCHOONER.—The new four-masted schooner Clarence Venner, recently built in Maine, arrived here yesterday with 1300 tons of ice from the Kennebec for Messrs. F. A. Reed & Co. The schooner is a very handsome vessel and is fitted with all the modern improvements.

LOCAL BREVITIES. The funeral of the late Miss Salina Diller took place from St. Mary's church this morning.

The colored Odd Fellows, of this city, yesterday celebrated the anniversary of the foundation of that order. They attended services in a body in full regalia at Z. C. church.

Gen. Lee introduced in the House of Representatives on Saturday a bill appropriating \$7,000 for the construction of a roadway from the city of Alexandria to the Federal cemetery near that place.

In addition to his duties as general superintendent of the Richmond and Danville road Capt. W. H. Green has been appointed assistant general manager of the line and is authorized to act as general manager when necessary.

Mr. G. P. Hill will to-morrow apply for a charter for a shoe factory company. He says he has been invited to come to Charlottesville, where he has been offered a building, rent free, and other inducements to start a shoe factory there.

Two cars rattle off the track on the A. & F. road at the Milland crossing, west of this city this morning, but only slight damage was done and trains were delayed but a short time.

Eugene Ottenbourg has sold to Benj. Meyenber a half interest in the half square of ground bounded by Fairfax, Orange and Royal streets.

The steamer City of Alexandria has been temporarily withdrawn from the ferry line for repairs and the Arrowmith is running in her place.

The mean temperature in this city for February was 45°. The coldest day was the 7th—30° and the warmest the 26th—76°.
