REHEARSAL OF THE ALEXANDRIA MUSICAL ASSOCIATION.—The seating capacity of the Metropolitan Hall was fully tested last night on the occasion of the 22d complimentary rehearsal of the Alexandria Musical Association. That the audience was in happy accord with the efforts of the performers, the rapturous applause with which the several numbers were received fully attested. It was a gala night and everything went off with a rhythmic swing. We noted with some surprise that our whistler, the gentle, sunny and talented Mr. McKnight Baldwin, was no longer in his accustomed place as director. The position, however, was quite well supplied by Mr. Frank Field, who was a rapid and correct reader and who was in the habit of the confidence and skill of a practiced conductor, while Mr. Baldwin rendered most excellent service on first violin, on which he performed with a spirit and dash that seemed to activate and energize his associates. The opening number (reed and brass) was a march, by Schaefer; it is a pleasant composition and was smoothly and sweetly performed. The euphonium solo by Mr. H. C. Nails, a fantasia on "O'D folks at Home," was a very clever performance, receiving an encore, in response to which he gave "Little Annie Rooney" with good effect. Selection from "Fra Diavolo" by orchestra was neatly and spiritedly given and was well received. "O, Happy Day," by Miss Virginia Evans, a sweet and patriotic ballad, was skillfully rendered, receiving an encore, for which she gave "Birds in Dreamland," a graceful and gracefully executed, which was rewarded with a recall. Miss Evans' flexibility of voice together with an excellent method, even and well- sustained tones, renders her singing uncommonly pleasing and effective. "Razze Dazzle," a pot pourri, in reed and brass, was lively and inspiring, setting the nerves tingling in responsive vibration. "Call Me Thine Own," reed and brass, was well delivered, and the well-remembered tune called up to many of the audience long ago pleasurable emotions. "Gee In Dreams," baritone solo by Mr. Geo. E. Terry, was given in his usual good style, eliciting an encore, to which he responded with "Anchored," and received a recall. "Amada," a waltz by the orchestra in tempo and accentuation, was excellent. "An Old Garden," Miss Virginia Evans, is sweet in sentiment and framed in tender and emotional music, which was beautifully interpreted by the vocalist. This received an emphatic encore, to which Miss Evans responded with "Kati's Letter," a pretty and characteristic Irish love story, which brought down the house and gave her a recall. The gem of the evening in instrumental execution was "Semper Fidelis," by Sousa (reed and brass), an excellent piece of work, replete with vivacity and yet solid harmony. So ended a most delightful evening's entertainment, and but one regret was heard expressed, and that was that this was the last of the season. The Musical Association is certainly worthy of all commendation as an amateur organization. It possesses much talent and even genius, and Alexandria may reasonably feel proud of it.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was clear and mild with 12 prisoners and two lodgers at the station house. The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: Mary Turner and Hester Carroll, colored, arrested for disorderly conduct, were fined \$1 each. Albert Lyles, arrested in Washington by special officer J. L. Smith charged with breaking into a car on the W. S. R. R., was turned over to the county authorities. Ben Boston, colored, charged with disorderly conduct at the colored Odd Fellows' hall, was fined \$1.50. A citizen of the Third ward charged with an assault on W. F. McFadden, was fined \$1.50. Wm. Price, colored, arrested for an assault on Eva Jackson, was fined \$1.50. Eight tramps, arrested on the charge of vagrancy, were put to work cleaning Washington street, and a policeman was delegated by the Mayor to see that the tramps worked. Hereafter tramps arrested here will be put to work on the streets.

A MONUMENT TO REV. WILLIAM WATERS.—Many of our oldest residents are familiar with the fact that the grave of the Rev. William Waters, the first native itinerant preacher of American Methodism and the warm personal friend of Bishop Asbury, lies a few miles outside of this city in the vicinity of Falls Church. Rev. Mr. Bishop, pastor of Trinity Church, called the attention of the Virginia Conference at its late session in this city to the importance of marking this grave before the few survivors who can still identify it have all passed away. It was determined to erect a monument. Mr. Waters was pastor of the Methodist Church in Alexandria in 1803-4. He was greatly attached to the Methodists of this city, and left them by will his library, an eight day clock, solid silver spoons, &c. Mr. Bishop will preach a memorial discourse to-morrow at 11 a. m. and take a collection in aid of the Waters monument. Bishop Fitzgerald subscribed \$100, and requested the pastor of Trinity Church to take charge of the erection of the monument.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge J. K. M. Norton presiding.—An order was entered recommending to the Governor the names of Drs. W. R. Purvis or W. M. Smith for the appointment as coroner for this city, under Section 891 of the Code. Court adjourned till to-morrow morning.

PERSONAL.—The condition of Mr. G. E. French was improved to-day. Mr. Jacob Brown and Miss Ida B. England, both of this city, were married in Washington yesterday. Mr. Brown, who for a number of years has been bookkeeper for Mr. L. Eichberg, has recently resigned his position and will hereafter reside in Philadelphia. Mr. Lawrence Stabler has gone to New York on a short visit. Mr. Frank T. King has returned from Piney Point, where he has been for the past two months. Mr. L. Marbury has returned from Reidsville, Northumberland county, where he went to institute Reidsville Lodge No. 7, K. of P. Mayor Downham has accepted an invitation from the Mayor of Richmond to be present at the unveiling of the Lee statue.

ANOTHER CHARTER.—Judge Norton to-day granted a charter to the Barrow Lead Company. The objects of the company are to purchase or lease mineral lands, to mine for iron, copper, oil, gas, coal, salt, &c., to construct and operate mills. The capital stock is to be \$5,000,000 divided into shares of \$100 each. The principal office is to be in this city. C. L. Adkins is named as president and B. F. Bipes, secretary and treasurer. All the officers are non-residents. The tax paid to the State for this charter was \$200.

FEBRUARY FALL.—J. E. Smith, while engaged in the construction of a railroad water tank at Burke's station this morning fell from the top to a pile of iron and stones beneath, a distance of 25 feet, and was seriously injured, his head and face being terribly cut. Dr. O'Brien, who was summoned, dressed the injured man's wounds and sent him to his home in Dinwiddie.

BUILDING ASSOCIATION.—At a meeting of Mechanics' Building Association No. 3 last night Mr. J. C. Milburn was elected president in place of Mr. H. Strauss, resigned, and Mr. W. F. Lambert was made a director in place of Mr. Milburn. The Association made loans amounting to \$2,000 at par.

OPERA HOUSE.—The closing event of the theatrical season in this city will take place next Thursday night, when the musical comedy of "Fun in a Boarding-School" will be presented for the first time here. The company, which is said to be a good one, is now playing in Baltimore to large audiences.

CENSUS ENUMERATORS.—Supervisor of Census Wirgfield, of this district, has named W. P. Graves and D. W. Whiting as enumerators for the First ward in this city. Among the other nominations for this city are S. B. Padgett, A. Oehlert, T. I. Edehn and G. A. Nowland.

FISH.—Since yesterday about 20,000 herring and 100 shad have arrived at Fishtown. Herring sold at \$2.50, \$3.00 per thousand and shad at \$15 per hundred.
