ALIVE IN HER COFFIN.—The wife of John Karb, 40 years of age, living on the River road near Newport, Ky., was to all appearance dead last Monday, after a long spell of sickness. The body was prepared for burial, and on Wednesday, while the pall-bearers were carrying the casket from the church, they heard a noise inside the coffin, and upon removing the lid the woman was found to be alive, but too weak to speak. The greatest consternation among relatives and others in attendance ensued when the woman opened her eyes. Women screamed and ran about as if demented, and others fainted. Many of the men lost their presence of mind, and it was only when the woman sat up that aid was extended. She could not speak, and was evidently terribly frightened. She was taken into the church and made comfortable while a physician was sent for. Before he arrived the lady moaned, started to an upright position and fell back dead. The physician on arrival pronounced her a corpse, and she was buried at once. There is much excitement in the neighborhood, and many believe she should not have been buried.

MR. MILLS AND THE ALLIANCE.—Representative Mills has answered the letter of the Farmers' Alliance, of Milan county, Texas, asking him to favor the establishment of government warehouses for the storage of agricultural products and issue upon them treasury notes to the extent of 80 per cent. of the value of the products. He says when the government begins to take charge of cotton, wheat, corn, oats and tobacco, it will go on, and in time bacon, pork, beef, butter, cheese, lard, hay and all other farm products will demand the government to take their surplus and advance them 80 per cent. on it. He adds that the only way in which the farmer can be helped is by the success of the tariff reform for which Cleveland fought and fell. Regrettably he declines to support the Alliance proposition. Concluding, he says: "I am too old to change the convictions of a life time. I am a democrat because I believe the great sum of woes which humanity suffers come from the disregard of democratic principles. I can afford to retire to private life, but I cannot afford to share the guilt of participating in an act that will bring distress and suffering to millions of my fellow citizens."

MAINE ICE CROP.—The Ice Trade Journal for May contains detailed statistics of the Maine ice harvest. The number of tons cut the past winter exceeds any previous harvest by one and one half million tons, showing a grand total of 3,933,400 tons, of which 1,411,200 is on the Kennebec river, 506,300 on the Penobscot, 42,300 tons on the Catawba and 839,300 along the coast and interior ponds, also 268,800 tons shipped direct from ponds by vessels. It further shows ice has been cut in 100 different towns and cities and is now stored in 230 ice houses. Nineteen thousand and ninety men and 4,620 horses were at work, showing of what value the crop has been the past winter to the laboring man.

A MYSTERY.—Messrs. Bartboldt and Effel have, after careful calculation, pronounced that the celebrated wonder of the world, the Colossus of Rhodes, as described by ancient historians, could not possibly have existed, for technical reasons. Effel has explained the problem out thoroughly with Bartboldt, and proved, as conclusively as modern science can go, that the legend of the Colossus is as mythical as those of Hercules, or any other of the sun gods of old.
