The amount cleared was nearly \$16.

THE COUNTY VOTE.—At the election in the county on Thursday all three of the precincts voted for the special school tax—there being but one vote against it, that being in Jefferson district. In Jefferson the tax was fixed at 20 cents and received 43 votes; in Arlington district 25 cents and 35 votes, and in Washington district at 45 cents and 39 votes.

FALLS CHURCH ELECTION.—The town election at Falls Church on Thursday resulted in the election of the following councilmen; viz M. F. Chambin, G. W. Haxhurst, J. H. C. Brown, Nathan Lynch, J. I. Brown, B. B. Meritt and Geo. Crossman. The council elects the Mayor, Clerk and Sergeant.

STORM.—This city was visited last night by a thunder storm, which commenced about 8:30 o'clock and continued for some time. During the storm the lightning was very vivid and rain fell in torrents, flooding many of the streets but doing little damage.
The Barrow Land and the Potomac Mining and Reduction companies met in the office of Mr. K. K. Keenan to-day and organized under the charter recently granted them.

VIRGINIA NEWS.

Neither party nominated candidates in Roanoke, but on Thursday all democrats were elected.

At the unveiling of the Lee monument in Richmond on the 29th the Governors of Georgia, South Carolina, West Virginia and Florida are expected to be present, as are also a number of Senators and Representatives.
The work of Confederate decoration in Richmond, in honor of General Lee has begun. Gov. McKinney has issued a proclamation requesting the citizens of Virginia to abstain from secular employment on the day of the unveiling of the Lee monument.

In the election at Culpeper on Thursday for mayor Capt. W. A. Asby (dem) was elected over C. B. Hood, esq., (rep.); J. O. Jones as sergeant over Mr. Hansbrough, the present incumbent; W. A. Spottwell, recorder, re-elected without opposition, and about half the old council.
The approaching commencement of Roanoke College, June 8-11, promises to be one of usual interest. The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by Rev. Wm. Nelson McVicar, of Philadelphia. On Monday and Tuesday evenings, after the literary exercises at the town hall, the campus will be brilliantly illuminated, and the band will furnish music for the promenaders.

In the county court of Stafford county, Thursday, Dr. Harrison Wagner was placed on trial, charged with instituting fraudulent suits in the county court of Stafford against the Adams Express Company amounting to nearly \$2,000,000. Among the witnesses were several physicians from Richmond, whose testimony was to the effect that Wagner is crazy. His counsel put in this plea, and the jury returned a verdict in accordance.

Commencing to-morrow a song and gospel meeting will be held at the railroad men's reading room, corner Wilkes and Henry streets, every Sunday from 3:30 to 4:30 p. m. Good singing and short talks will be the order, and a cordial invitation is extended to every railroad man to come. It is believed that these meetings will result to the mutual benefit of many.
