SHE TOOK THE FATAL DOSE.—Mrs. Susan Ney, aged 45 years, who, with her husband, Michael, lived in Boston, on Saturday afternoon by mistake drank a glass of lemonade in which she had put strychnine with the intention of giving it to her husband. She lingered until evening, when she died. Michael had been jealous of the attentions paid to Mrs. Ney by an elderly gentleman, and frequent quarrels resulted from his jealousy. Mrs. Ney had threatened to put her husband out of the way, and on Saturday prepared two glasses of lemonade, into one of which she put strychnine. This she offered to her husband, but he was suspicious and refused it. Then his wife said she would drink it to prove that it was harmless. During the talk the two glasses had been exchanged, and instead of drinking the harmless liquid she swallowed the poison. Michael had been lately induced to make over to his wife a small amount of money he had in the bank, but which would be available to her upon his death.

TAKING EGGS AS SECURITY FOR A LOAN. A curious case came up in the Supreme Court, in Providence, R. I., on Friday. The Fifth National Bank loaned \$5,000 to a produce dealer named Alesor, taking as security 392 cases of eggs stored with the Providence Warehouse Company. A search was made of the eggs from time to time, but they were always found to be fresh, so that there were always 392 cases in the warehouse. Finally he failed, paying six cents on the dollar, and the bank looked for its security, the eggs. When the bank finally sent for the eggs they were worth 20 cents, and the Board of Health ordered them buried, which was done. Now the bank suits the warehouse company for \$5,000, claiming that they agreed to keep the eggs safe, and the company claims that they did not, but they could not prevent them from spoiling.
