Ensign E. Taylor was admitted to practice law in this court.

The grand jury returned indictments against those who were yesterday prosecuted for violating the Sunday liquor laws, and summonses were issued to all so indicted to appear in Court to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The grand jury also presented an indictment against Mr. Edmund Burke for practicing law without a license. Mr. Burke had tendered coupons in payment for his license, which tender had been refused by the City Treasurer under the State law.

The grand jury was then discharged. Court will adjourn to-morrow.

It is probable that the cases against those indicted for violating the Sunday liquor laws will be continued on the next term, but this has not been settled yet, and it is currently reported that Judge Norton will revoke the licenses of all convicted of the violation of the law. Judge Norton said today that if any attempt was made to defeat the ends of justice by technicalities, he would see that such attempt was frustrated, and that if a fight was made by those indicted he would surely fight back. He says that he has never been noticed from the bench, which was published in the GAZETTE, what he intended to do in cases where violators of the Sunday laws were brought before him.
