**As Good as Gold**

I am one of half a dozen men standing in front of a well-known saloon yesterday was a man known to the fraternity as a "lucky one" in the sporting class. He had in former years raked in measy a jack-pot in St. Louis, and was one of the few who became rich by gambling. Spending of the city before gambling was broken up, the man recently returned, said:

"Let me tell you a good story of—(you all know who I mean). Well, for nine years we were partners. Every trick he turned I was in with, and if I made a winning he shared it. I never could tell what broke our combination, but one morning after we had counted \$900, after an all-night play, he said: 'I have played my last card and turned my last trick. Suckers are plenty and money seems to come easy. I have a few dollars and with it I am going to lead a new life.'"

"I was shocked and thought I was being gyped, but not so. He meant just what he said and reformed, but before we parted my partner said to me: 'We may both live many years and I will never forget the good times we have had together. I am going to quit gambling; you are not, but whether you do or not, if you ever play a stack of blues think of me, and if you win bury half of them to live on.'"

"That was nearly five years ago. Now, then, comes my story. Only five years ago I heard of my former partner conducting a religious meeting in the town where I was, and I quit a good game just to go and see him. He did not know that I was in a thousand miles of him. Before going to the church I took a blue chip and marked not only his initials but mine on it. I went to church and was seated about half way down the aisle. There were singing and several short speeches but I began to feel that I was in the wrong pew, because I did not see my former partner. The choir sang 'Hold the Fort,' and just as I was about to leave, my former partner appeared and made a few remarks and then asked the congregation to contribute as the choir sang. Two men whom I knew very well and have beaten out of many a dollar, passed the baskets. When one came to me I threw in my blue chip and smiled in my sleeve when I thought of what my former partner would think when he saw it. I will never go again where he is, for when the money was poured out on the table to stepped to the edge of the pulpit and said:

"I hold in my hand a blue chip. It's worth \$20. It's as good as gold, for the man who put it in has endorsed it with his name. I've held many a one with him, and he has owed me large sums of money, and I know that this check will be redeemed." That was all he said. I took my hat and went to the door and found an usher. **The Mississippi Convention.**

In the Mississippi convention at Jackson yesterday Judge Carleton offered a substitute to that section of the constitution relating to suffrage, providing as follows:

Males of sound mind and of the age of 21 years, and citizens of the United States by birth or naturalization, who have never been convicted of any crime made a felony by the laws of this State, and who have resided in the State six months and in the county one year, provided they or their wives own, in fee simple, a homestead, or one or the other of them is possessed of unencumbered property, real or personal, of the value of \$200, liable for taxes and not delinquent for taxation. It shall be competent for the legislature to make petty larceny, selling liquor without a license, or buying or selling lottery tickets in this State a forfeiture of the right to exercise the elective franchise.

No soldier, sailor or marine shall have the right to vote because mentioned here. Before any person is allowed to register he shall make oath "I have read and comprehend the articles of the constitution of this State, which prescribe the qualification of voters. I am not debarred by the tests it prescribes, but am entitled to the same, so help me God."

No person shall be eligible to any office of profit or trust who is not a qualified elector.

Mr. Kennedy, of Clay, moved an amendment to make residence in the State three and in the county two years with a poll-tax of \$2.

Mr. Myers submitted an ordinance to abolish the convict leasing system after January 1, 1895, or sooner if practicable, and on his motion a committee of seven was appointed to consider all propositions relating to the penitentiary.

The plan of suffrage submitted by Mr. DeLard was to reapportion the State so as to give the balance of power to the white counties; also providing for election by the Legislature of State officers and the appointment by the Governor of county and district officers.

Mr. Campbell submitted two plans of suffrage, one providing for an additional vote to every owner of real property to the value of one thousand dollars and another giving an additional vote to all who are related within the third degree to the owner, male or female, of property to the value of \$250.

Mr. Taurin filed a resolution prohibiting alien ownership of land.
