

LOCAL NEWS.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Wm. M. Dame, formerly of this city, but now of Baltimore, has been commissioned chaplain of the Fifth Regiment, M. N. G., with rank of captain, vice R. V. Jos. Reynolds, resigned, having removed to New York.

Miss Emma A. Auston, of Virginia, has been appointed a copyist in the Pension Office in Washington at a salary of \$800.

The Richmond correspondent of the Petersburg Appeal says: "I hear that Hon. Frank Hume, who is opposing Gen. W. H. F. Lee for Congress in the Eighth district, entered the canvass with the intention of spending \$10,000 of his own money to promote his election. Hume is quite wealthy and is a fine canvasser, though nothing of a speaker. He works on the still hunt plan. Hume and Lee were both at Louisa Court-house Tuesday. Lee made a speech, while Hume talked with the boys around the corner."

The Bodie, Cal., Miner says: "Brixton H. Miner has been engaged by the Democratic State Central Committee to stump Inyo and Mono counties in the interest of their ticket. Mr. Miner is a young man with a national reputation as a speaker, having been one of the selected speakers in the State of New York during the last Cleveland campaign." Mr. Miner is a native of this city, where he has many friends.

Judge A. A. Freeman, of Falls Church, left on Wednesday for New Mexico, to enter upon his duties as one of the chief justices of that territory.

Miss Jennie Henderson, who has been spending the summer in Fauquier county, has returned home.

Mr. Estess C. D. Patton and Miss Viola W. Baggett, daughter of Mr. B. F. Baggett, were married at the residence of the bride's parents on upper King street yesterday evening and left for a northern trip.

Mr. T. S. Taltafiero, who has been visiting friends in this city, left today for his home, at Green River, Wyoming.

Mr. George Usher, of this city, has opened a real estate office in Goshen, which bids fair to be a flourishing town in the near future.

Dr. M. W. O'Brien has been appointed surgeon of the R. & D. R. E. for Washington as well as for this city.

Judge Wallace, of Fredericksburg, will hold tomorrow a session of the Corporation Court for Judge Norton, who will be absent from the city.

Mrs. W. E. Baker, of King George county, is visiting Mrs. Thomas Perry.

A letter from Fredericksburg to the Richmond Times says: "The latest from Stafford and King George says that the democrats and many of the republicans of those counties will stand solidly by Lee for Congress. The many hoisted assertions through the press and otherwise that Hume will sweep the two counties by an overwhelming majority is emphatically denied by representative men there of both parties."

BUILDING ASSOCIATION MEETING.—A meeting of the subscribers to the stock of the Old Dominion Perpetual Building Association was held last night at Concordia Hall, and an organization effected by the election of the following officers until the first Tuesday in January, 1891: John R. Zimmerman, President; L. E. Usher, Secretary; Worth H. Fish, Treasurer; Charles King, F. E. Corbett, L. McK. Bell, M. B. Harlow and Alex. Lyles, Directors. The books showed that 606 shares of stock had been subscribed for.

At a meeting of directors held after the adjournment of the stockholders, Thomas Leadbeater, G. B. Carlin and W. H. Hall were elected Trustees, and James R. Catoe, Attorney. It was ordered that the first meeting of the association for the payment of dues be held on the 4th Monday of November if books can be got ready.

FIRE IN THE COUNTY.—An extensive fire took place yesterday at the brick works of Mr. W. T. Walker, in the county, a short distance south of the Long bridge. The fire broke out in the machine house, which was destroyed. The loss included a large amount of costly machinery, embracing a 100-horse power boiler, a new 50-horse power engine, a Martin brick machine, a patent brick drier, a drying house, &c. The loss is estimated at \$20,000. A dwelling and its contents near by was also burned, and one man had his leg broken. The village of Bicknover, in which the brick yards are located, has no movable fire apparatus, but lofty tanks have been built in most of the brick yards to force water for use in time of fire.

HYDRAULIC S. F. E. CO.—A called meeting of this company was held last night, Richard L. Carne, president, in the chair, and S. Robert Shion secretary. The chair stated that the meeting had been called to receive the report of the special committee on the excursion to Chester, which was not ready at the regular meeting. It was made by J. C. Gill, chairman, and was highly satisfactory. An application from the Fame Fire Company of Westchester, Pa., for a badge of the company for a collection being made was acceded to, one of the members volunteering to furnish the badge. The company then adjourned.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was rainy till about 12 o'clock, when it became clear and cool.

The Mayor this morning dispensed of the following cases: Lemuel Washington and Richard Lancaster, colored, arrested by Officers Taylor and Brenner, charged with disorderly conduct, were discharged, and John Deleman, colored, arrested on the same charge, was fined \$2.50.

Robert Cheber, arrested by Officer Bettis, charged with disorderly conduct, was discharged with a reprimand.

PRESENTATION TO CAPT BARKER.—Several weeks ago the Lady of the Lake encountered a severe northeaster on her trip to Norfolk and was delayed three days in reaching her destination, being laid up for safety at various points on the route, the longest stop being in the Rappahannock river. Yesterday morning Capt. Barker was presented by some of the passengers with a fine marine glass as a token of their appreciation of his ability as a seaman and approval of his conduct in bringing them safely through the storm.

FIRE AT SHEPHERD'S.—Last night a fire occurred in the switchmen's house at Shepherd's, on the opposite side of the river, and burning through the floor of the house set fire to the wharf. The tug Brewerton, which was lying in her slip in this city, was signaled, and in a few minutes was at the scene sending two quenching streams on the fire, which after some difficulty was apparently extinguished. The fire, however, broke out again later, when it was effectually quenched by the tug. The damage was slight.

MASONIC.—An interesting meeting of Andrew Jackson Lodge, A. F. & A. M., was held last night. After an exemplification of the third degree work, the lodge repaired to the Hotel Fleischman, where a banquet had been prepared, and where an hour was pleasantly passed in discussing it.

BASE BALL.—The return game of base ball between the club of St. John's Academy and the junior club of Georgetown College, was begun on the grounds back of Colburn yesterday afternoon, but was stopped after the fourth inning by the heaviness of the rain. The college boys came into the academy and took supper, leaving about half-past six for the college. The score stood six to six.

No business was transacted in the Corporation Court today.

The sheriff of Loudoun county arrived here this evening in charge Lem Thomas and Wormley Hughes, both colored, and the latter a preacher, recently convicted of house breaking and sentenced to 2 and 5 years in the penitentiary respectively. The men were lodged at the station house till the train left that took them to Richmond.

The further improvement was confined to similar small fractions, but after some hesitation the upward movement was resumed late in the hour. At 11 o'clock the market was fairly active and strong at the best prices reached.
