RING RECOVERED.—A few weeks since, as stated in the GAZETTE at the time, Mr. Thomas D. Addison, of Fairfax Station, discovered imbedded in a hoof of one of his cows a large sealing ring. The ring had engraved upon the seal the coat of arms of Mexico, the word "Mexico" and a Spanish word that he could not decipher. Inside were the words, "H. J. Hunt, Worth's Div."

ADDRESS TO COLORED VOTERS.—Some of the colored people of this city have issued an address to the colored voters. The address after alluding to the fact that the colored vote constitutes a large majority of the republican strength of the district, complains of bad treatment under the present administration. The colored men, it declares, are denied office and held to simple machines to obey orders. Mr. Hume is styled an "unpledged independent nominee" and the negro voters are urged to support a man of their own race. The address says: "Are you satisfied to be led along like an organ-grinder's monkey, that jumps around, grins and takes off its hat every time its master pulls the string that is fastened about its neck? No, colored voters, we cannot think you will thus submit. But we'll arise, assert our manhood and vote a straight republican ticket."

Clara Carter and Gerlie Brown, both colored, for disorderly conduct, were fined \$1 each. A white man, charged with an assault on another man, was fined \$2.50.

WEDDING.—The wedding of Mr. Edward H. Kemper and Miss Fanote Green, daughter of Major John W. Green, took place at St. Paul's Church this morning. Rev. Dr. Norton conducted the ceremony in the presence of a large number of friends of the contracting parties, many of them being from a distance. The altar was prettily decorated for the occasion, and Miss Virginia Evans presided at the organ. The bride, in a becoming traveling suit of green cloth, with hat to match, entered the church upon the arm of her father. The groom's best man was Mr. George H. Evans. The ushers were Messrs. R. Ernest Aton, J. Frank Carlin, Robert L. Monroe, B. F. Jacobs and Maurice Burke, of Washington. After the ceremonies Mr. and Mrs. Kemper took the north-bound train for Niagara Falls and eastern New York, accompanied as far as Washington by a number of their friends. The bride and groom were the recipients of a large number of beautiful and useful presents.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

New York, October 22.—The strength in yesterday afternoon's market was again shown this morning, and on a moderate volume of business further fractional improvement was made along the line. First prices were generally from 1/4 to 1/2 per cent. better than last evening's final figures, and the list moved upward steadily from the first sales. The market later reacted from the best prices, and in many cases all the early improvement was lost. There was no other special feature, and the later dealings were marked by dullness and stagnation, but the market at 11 o'clock was steady to firm, generally at small fractions better than the opening figures.
